'It takes a special person to do it'

Williams retires as N'hampton deputy

Recently retired Northampton County Sheriff's Office Lt. Francis Williams remembers the exact day he began his career in law enforcement: Aug. 9, 1982.

The Eastern Shore native grew up in Treherneville

in Northampton County, where he attended local public schools, graduating from Northampton High School in 1977.

Williams had not planned to enter law enforcement. Instead, he studied auto mechanics at Thomas Nelson Community College in Hampton.

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Oak Hall woman still missing after crash

The case of Alyssa N. Taylor, the woman who went missing after a truck crash in North Carolina, is still being investigated — and could be for months to come.

Taylor, 25, of Oak Hall, was reported missing almost a week after her family last heard from her, and after she had told her mother she was going to travel in a tractor-trailer with a friend for a few days.

Taylor's family thinks she died in a Sept. 14 crash, when a truck driven by Danny McNeal, 51, of Exmore, crashed into the side of a bridge on

2 injured in crash on Chincoteague Rd.

STAFF REPORT

Two people were transported to a Maryland hospital with injuries Thursday after a Jeep driven by an 82-year-old man became lodged under a tractor-trailer in a crash on Chincoteague Road.

The crash happened on Chincoteague Road west of Coardtwn Road, in Wattsville, around 9:09 a.m., according to Virginia State Police Spokeswoman Michelle Anaya.

A tractor-trailer was trying to back into a private driveway from the road when it was struck by a 2010 Jeep traveling east, resulting in the Jeep becoming lodged under the trailer.

The driver of the Jeep, an 82-year-

old New Church man, and a 67-year-old woman, also of New Church, were taken to TidalHealth Peninsula Regional Medical Center in Salisbury, Md., with injuries that were not life threatening, according to Anaya.

The truck driver, a 59-year-old male, was not injured.

Police did not immediately name those involved in the crash.

No charges have been placed and the investigation is ongoing, Anaya said.

A medical aircraft was called to the scene and the highway department was on scene rerouting traffic after the crash, Anaya said.

The road reopened to traffic at 10:06 a.m.

tin, must have seen Williams' potential, because he kept asking Williams when he was going to become a police officer.

Finally, in 1982, he applied and became employed as a dispatcher, launching a career Williams said is akin to being a member of a family.

Without those relationships, "I don't think I could have made it," Williams said.

Along the way, Williams essentially became an ambassador for the sheriff's office — someone whose positive personality and can-do attitude reflected well on his employer and his community.

After serving as a dispatcher for three years, he attended school to receive training in supervising inmates and became a jail deputy.

Among his many duties, Williams performed routine safety checks and assisted in the transport of inmates to and from court or other appointments outside of the jail.

By the time the new Eastern Shore Regional Jail opened in 2007, Williams had been promoted to lieutenant and became the second in command of the facility after Captain Roger Kennedy.

Williams' many responsibilities included ensuring the security of the jail, overseeing facility operations, paying bills, and ordering uniforms, equip-

ment, and vehicles.

The part of the job that Williams enjoyed most was helping the inmates in their quest to become better citizens. Sometimes that meant doing a simple task that an inmate was unable to do, such as making a phone call to find out how much the inmate owed in court costs.

One of the greatest challenges of being in law enforcement for 40 years was dealing with the continual changes to the profession, Williams said.

When Williams started working at the jail, only one deputy was required to cover a shift, but when he retired, a minimum of six deputies per shift was required.

Developing friendships with colleagues, which he called a "brotherhood or sisterhood," was key to Williams' longevity in the profession.

Whenever the deputies' families went through troubles, "we had each other's back."

Not just anybody makes a good jail deputy; "it takes a special person to do it," Williams said.

The qualities he would look for in a deputy are fairness, honesty, and "someone you can depend on ... through thick and thin."

Over the last 40 years, Williams has worked for four Northampton County sheriffs: William "Tank" Belote, Wayne Bradford, John "Jack" Robbins, and most recently, David Doughty.

When he wasn't on duty at the jail, Williams helped out at the John O. Morris Funeral Home in Nassawadox. He has worked there part time regularly over the last four or five years.

Some of the things he has enjoyed when he wasn't working included playing softball, serving on the Eastern Shore Literacy Council for four years, and attending Union Baptist Church in Eastville.

His faith sustained him for the 40 years he spent in law enforcement and his entire life.

Williams said, "You have to put God in it first. ... No matter what you're doing, he'll help you through it."

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Do-Drop fundraiser keeps the fun and music alive

Supporters of Giddens' Do-Drop Inn gathered Saturday, Oct. 1, in Weirwood to celebrate the establishment's 55th anniversary and raise funds to renovate the building and help continue its tradition of hosting live music.

The Do-Drop Inn is among the oldest continuously operated Black-owned businesses on the Eastern Shore and is known for hosting music legends including Arthur "Big Boy" Crudup, Black Elvis, J. Plunky and Oneness, and Burleigh Strand and the All-Stars, among many others who performed there over the years.

Crudup, a field laborer and blues artist whose songs were covered by Elvis Presley, Elton John, and Rod Stewart, played at the Do-Drop Inn every

weekend at one time.

Proprietor Jane Giddens Cabarrus thanked those who purchased tickets for Saturday's event, which included dinner, dancing, and live music by the Down 'n Outs Band, a group of local musicians formed specifically for the occasion.

DJ Billy Sturgis spun tunes during dinner, including from the album he produced, "Franktown Blues," by Crudup's three sons.

The Do-Drop Inn served as the rehearsal hall for the album, produced by Sturgis' record label, Warehouse Records.

Cabarrus in particular thanked contractor Luke Kellam, whose expertise is bringing the 1967 building back to life.

"I want you all to know that on this day, the reason that you are inside the Giddens' Do-Drop Inn is that we have come together with a community person who loved us at heart, who loved the Do-Drop Inn at heart and saw fit to make it possible for us to be here today," Cabarrus said, introducing Kellam.

"I'm so very proud that he came to us at a time when we needed help," she said.

'A special place'

Kellam said Cabarrus and music supporter Peg Volk approached him during an event on the Do-Drop Inn grounds.

"It was clear some work needed to happen in here," Kellam said.

A proposal they had received from a contractor off the Shore was much too high, Kellam said, adding that what he

saw as someone trying to take advantage of others "really bothered me so badly."

"I told Peg, 'Listen, I'll take care of this,'" he said.

Since then, a structural engineer looked at the building and they came up with a plan to renovate it.

Renovations continue on the structure, but it was able to be opened for Saturday's event after bad weather prevented it from being held outside.

"In my 18 years of business now, no project has brought me more joy than doing this," Kellam said, adding of Cabarrus, "She's my mother now."

"It's a special place, special people. It has been just a total and complete privilege to be a part of it," Kellam said.

'Prayer and determination'

Giddens' Legendary Do-Drop Inn "was built on prayer and determina-

tion by Lloyd Henry Giddens and Annie Maude Baines Giddens, and opened for business on July 18, 1967," according to a narrative written by Katherine Walsh.

Cabarrus is the youngest of Giddens' seven children.

Lloyd Giddens, a carpenter by trade and also a factory worker, built the structure using materials salvaged from the recently demolished home of a friend.

The structure standing today was Giddens' second attempt at opening the business.

He tried to construct the venue prior to that but was unable to borrow the \$2,000 needed to complete the work, and the building fell into disrepair, according to Cabarrus.

The restaurant and lounge was started as a safe place for the Black community to gather during the era of segregation.

"The '60s wasn't a good time for the Eastern Shore, but we had good Caucasian people on our side that really looked out for Daddy," Cabarrus said

in a 2017 interview.

The establishment at one time was open seven days a week, offering soul food, a jukebox, penny candy, and a firm handshake for members of the Shore's Black community, who were excluded from many venues at the time.

Giddens also welcomed White patrons who came through the doors, including a local beer distributor (Sturgis' father) who sometimes dropped by for a meal.

"One thing he would say in particular was 'You treat all people the same,'" Cabarrus said about her father in the 2017 interview.

"The Do-Drop Inn is renowned for providing an inclusive business, community center, and adopted home for entertainment, cultural activities, charitable service, volunteer groups like 25+ years of students from Boston College, and private events," Walsh wrote.

Walsh organized an online fundraiser for the establishment, which may be found at <https://www.gofundme.com/f/do-drop-inn-weirwood>

"We are raising \$250,000 for upgrades and improvements to the Do-Drop Inn to ensure a healthy and safe recovery post-pandemic, and to preserve an important historical landmark and gathering place on the ESVA," Walsh wrote on the website.

She noted funds raised will be used to upgrade the kitchen and appliances, electrical and HVAC systems, and bathrooms, as well as to improve the building envelope, to improve parking and the outdoor space, and to install a new well.

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THE EXMORE SEWER PROJECT...THE REST OF THE STORY!

For well over 14 years folks have been visiting our small antique and clock store next to the post office in Exmore, and we are honored to serve and enjoy the company of each and every one.

Lately many locals have been voicing their concerns to us about Exmore's sewage expansion plans, so we thought we would share what we know about that issue while at the same time supporting the new leadership of this great newspaper under Ted Shockley's journalistic watch and celebrate this transition.

EXMORE'S SEWAGE EXPANSION

Most locals tell us that they are rather miffed that they "have" to sign easements allowing the town to expand the existing sewer infrastructure and agree to a monthly sewage bill for that service. While both are in essence true, the reality is that it is indeed the town of Exmore that is "being made" to undertake the massive project to connect over 900 properties to the proposed expansion. Let's talk.

In 2008, after a number of private and commercial septic systems began failing, the town borrowed millions of dollars (a debt service still in existence today) to have contractors install sewer lines to about 350 properties and erect a treatment plant on the seaside road north of Willis Wharf. However, because we did not have the oversight of Robert Duer, Taylor Dukes and the current leadership on the town council, within months the new treatment plant failed, mostly because of design flaws and hydric soils. Enter the state health department which correctly "red tagged" the plant and forced the town into a consent order in which the town agreed to fix the problem. Also, until it was fixed, Exmore was forbidden to expand connections to any new or existing homes or businesses. No new restaurants, no new grocery stores, no new affordable housing developments...no "new" anything.

After spending years and tens of thousands of dollars trying to fix the failing plant while working on many affordable options to handle our sewage needs, town leaders rolled up their sleeves and worked with the DEQ, USGS, the Department of Health, as well as state, federal, and regional elected officials to come up with a workable solution. That plan calls for expanding sewer service to every home and business that has town water (900+ properties) and delivering that waste to the Hampton Roads sewer district's (HRSD) proposed sewer pipe that will run up the old rail bed. This scheme saves the taxpayers many millions of dollars as we do not have to construct, maintain, staff, and power a sewage treatment plant that would drive our costs through the roof while also having a limited lifespan.

As for concern over costs, the ticket price of a private septic system after failure can run from \$8 grand for an upgrade to \$30 grand for an engineered system. Plus, data yields that over 30% of private systems needing inspection preceding sale fail that test. Also, private systems have an average lifespan of 20-30 years, and those tanks have to be pumped out every 5 years at considerable expense. Real estate appraisers estimate that the selling cost of a home on a municipal water/sewer system is at least \$25,000 more than those sporting private treatment. Add to that the fact that a new sewage treatment plant at an average cost of \$4 mil, has a limited life needing an infusion of massive taxpayer dollars every 20-35 years.

The fact prevails that if we do not tackle this problem in real time, the health department could literally shut the town down by barring any more sewage from getting to our failed plant. In short, the town dies. No water. No growth. No business. No future. No meals tax or transient occupancy tax revenue. This project is not a choice by the town. It is a mandate.

We can assure you that this undertaking has the unconditional support of funders unprecedented on this type of project in the history of Virginia. Because of the town's work, the vast majority of the funding will be coming from grants, loan forgiveness, federal funds, and low interest loans. It is estimated that the monthly cost for this reliable and mandated sewer service will be among the lowest in the Commonwealth.

And because of Robert Duer's "David and Goliath" work, we will be the only town in Virginia which retains ownership of our new collection system rather than signing it over to HRSD while still being on the hook for paying for the nearly 20 million dollar infrastructure. What he and Taylor Dukes have done on this issue should be roundly toasted....not roasted.

In order to start this critical process we all need to sign an easement allowing the town to install (as part of the total cost) grinder pumps and sewage pipes to get the waste to HRSD's force main. Right now, less than 1/3 of those signatures needed to get this project underway have been collected and delay only means rising costs. We urge all to get on board so we can keep living, working, and enjoying this great town and its exciting future.

The Accomack County Department of Public Works is pleased to announce the countywide *"Fall Clean-Up"* to be held on **Saturday October 8, 2022**. In an effort to encourage citizens of Accomack to remove unsightly refuse from their yards, homes, and communities, the **Accomack County Board of Supervisors will waive tipping fees at the North Landfill and South Transfer Station for residential waste and recyclable materials brought in on this day.** The waiver will also be open to non-residents possessing an Accomack County Solid Waste Decal. Commercial for hire waste haulers will be required to pay standard tipping fees.

Landfills will be open on Saturday, October 8, 2022 from 8:30 am to 4:00 pm to accept residential garbage, yard waste, and construction/demolition debris. The landfill will also accept the following recyclable materials:

- Tires (car and small truck only "LIMIT" 12 per person/day)
- Used Motor Oil, Scrap Metal, and car and truck batteries.

Recycling materials, such as plastic bottles, milk jugs, detergent bottles, any #1 or #2 plastics, newspapers, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, telephone books, cereal boxes, metal and aluminum cans, may be recycled at any of the County's 7 Convenience/Recycling Centers "FREE" year round.

Landfills and Convenience Centers will not accept materials deemed to be hazardous, such as: Paint, Pesticides, Biological hazards, asbestos, and heavy metals. Please check with the attendants at these sites as to where and how to dispose of hazardous materials.

The Department of Solid Waste looks forward to working with the citizens of Accomack County on this program and encourages everyone to mark their calendars for the Spring Clean Up - the second Saturday of May every year! Soggy Shore watches the 'puddles gather rain'

Hurricane Ian's remnants affected the Eastern Shore this week, resulting in widespread tidal flooding and a call for voluntary evacuation of Chincoteague, but also bringing much-needed rain to the area.

Between Thursday and Monday, 3.7 inches of rainfall was recorded at Wallops Island, according to the National Weather Service.

Accomack, Northampton, and the town of Chincoteague declared a local state of emergency Sunday ahead of the second half of the coastal storm system resulting from Ian, which had the effects of a nor'easter on the Shore.

People in the low-lying Bunker Hill and Ocean Breeze areas of Chincoteague, in particular, were urged to evacuate.

The voluntary evacuation was can-

celed and people who had evacuated were told they could return home around 5 p.m. Monday.

Chincoteague Director of Emergency Services Bryan Rush said Tuesday no damages were reported from the storm on the island and no one from Chincoteague went to the emergency shelter.

Two Virginia National Guard high-water vehicles with four personnel stationed on Chincoteague were demobilized Tuesday morning and returned to their home base.

The Chincoteague causeway, which the Virginia Department of Transportation monitored for flooding throughout the storm, was not closed.

The emergency declaration included a warning of high wind gusts up to 50 miles per hour and additional rainfall of 2 to 4 inches, with significant seaside tidal flooding through Tuesday.

I-85 in Orange County, N.C.

McNeal and his dog died in the fiery crash.

North Carolina authorities said they did not find evidence Taylor was in the truck at the time.

Taylor's mother and two aunts traveled to North Carolina to seek answers.

Viewing the wrecked truck themselves at a junkyard, they found a flip-flop and a blanket belonging to Taylor.

Before returning to the Eastern Shore, they decided to return to the crash site on the highway to set up a memorial to Taylor and McNeal.

In a video posted on Facebook, Taylor's aunt, Shelly Payton, showed a storm drain at the crash site, where Taylor's relatives found an earring they say belonged to Taylor's mother, which Taylor had borrowed and worn.

"There's no telling what else could be down here," Payton said in the video.

They retrieved the earring from the drain.

"It's definitely her earring," Taylor's

mother, Krista Taylor, said in the video.

Payton said Thursday the family had turned over the earring and several other items to the Accomack County Sheriff's Office.

"They didn't search this drain," Payton said of North Carolina personnel who investigated the crash site.

Payton wrote in a Facebook post Wednesday, "Our family won't stop until we have answers. We will have a service for Alyssa Taylor but not until we have more answers."

Payton said Thursday North Carolina State Police are taking over the

missing person case from Accomack because Taylor's cellphone last pinged in North Carolina.

The North Carolina Highway Patrol is working on reconstructing the crash, which the family was told could take "weeks or months," according to Payton.

Accomack County Sheriff Todd Wessells said his department continues to work with North Carolina officials.

"I told them if I need to send somebody down there, let me know, because I will do it."

Wessells said, "You need to have closure. We are trying to get it for them."

Major flooding was forecast for Monday's high tide cycles on Chincoteague, between 2 and 5 a.m. and again from 2 to 5 p.m.

The town council meeting on Chincoteague, scheduled for Monday eve-

ning, was canceled.

Schools were closed Monday in both counties due to the weather and Arcadia High School opened that day as an emergency shelter.

The National Weather Service reduced the forecast impacts from the storm for Tuesday and Wednesday, with moderate tidal flooding forecast through the Wednesday afternoon high

tide cycle.

Chincoteague rescinded its local state of emergency Tuesday at 9 a.m.

A coastal flood advisory and high surf advisory remained in effect through Tuesday evening and a high rip current risk remained in effect through Wednesday evening throughout the Shore.

Tangier weathered the storm fairly

well, despite some high winds and tidal flooding.

"We were lucky the wind switched so we didn't get as much tide flooding as what we could have," said Tangier Town Manager Laurie Thomas Tuesday.

Addressing Route 13 near Cape Charles

To the editor:

It's past time that the Virginia Department of Transportation and the Town of Cape Charles paid attention to the traffic problems on U.S. Route 13 at Stone Road.

The "new" flasher needs to be reworked and sequenced to mean one or both lights at the Food Lion entrance or Stone Road will be red at a normal speed, and a southbound flasher light should be installed before Stone Road. Just look at the new skid marks every week that are turning up.

Some approaches for reckoning with a poster that riled

Shawntaye Holden of Painter called to ask if the Eastern Shore Post was going to write about the Chincoteague teenager shown in a photo on social media holding a racist invitation to an upcoming homecoming dance.

Standing beside a girl in a local business that had no part in the ugliness, a male held a hand-drawn poster that read, “If I was Black, I would be picking cotton. But I’m White so I’m picking you” for a homecoming date.

Everybody agreed it was distasteful, ugly, and hurtful, and took to social media to say so. That’s where the agreement essentially ended.

What followed was an Eastern Shore convulsion — a spasm of disagreement amid thousands of comments.

Some called the poster a bad decision. Some called it from-the-heart racism. The child’s family issued a poignant apology from the Facebook page of its business — a different business from the one where the photo was taken.

The family said the young man “made a mistake that he will regret for a lifetime.” I reached out to the family but it did not immediately return my message.

Holden and others who contacted me felt the incident rose to the level of community news, in part because there were few other alternatives for justice.

“It’s 2022 – why is this still a thing?” she said of the poster.

“It’s not against the law to be racist, so what do you do?” she asked.

I called two people with deep Eastern Shore loyalties who have the intelligence and experience to

provide a helpful perspective during a hurtful time. They were very kind to share their thoughts.

‘Therapeutic in the end’

Marvin Bagwell said the best realistic outcome may have already happened — even though it wasn’t easy on anyone.

Bagwell, who is Black, graduated from Onancock High School in 1972 and then earned undergraduate and law degrees from Harvard University.

He lives in New York City and is vice president and chief counsel for a national title-insurance company.

He acknowledged the racist poster photograph wounded everyone — Black people, White people, and family and friends of the young man.

“Maybe the anger and the hurt is therapeutic in the end,” said Bagwell in a telephone interview. “But it certainly was not good for the folks in the middle of it.”

“Maybe this is the pain that we have to go through in order to educate and be educated.”

Bagwell was in the same Harvard Law School graduating class as Chief Justice John Roberts of the U.S. Supreme Court and worked in Richmond as an attorney with Tim Kaine, later to be a state governor and U.S. Senator.

In Richmond he was the first Black attorney for a massive law firm. He vividly recalls when he decided to leave Richmond — after a racist singing performance at a company Christmas party.

“I was furious and no one could understand why,” he said.

Bagwell said the offensive poster by the Chincoteague teenager apparently led to a time of soul-searching by everyone involved.

“The Black folks aren’t going to let it happen again,” he said, “and the White folks are going to be introspective, and say, “How did this guy learn this

(racial perspective)?”

Bagwell believed lessons gleaned from the incident will be important and hopefully easier than its immediate aftermath.

“You have to crush grapes to make wine,” he said.

‘Someone to win over’

The Rev. Douglas Tanner said an effective tack is not to isolate people accused of racism. Instead, a thoughtful approach might be to bring them close and change their feelings.

As Tanner said, it is the process of “seeing an adversary as someone to win over, not someone to defeat.”

Tanner, who is White, has been a minister at United Methodist Churches in Onancock and Craddockville. He lives in Washington, D.C., where he founded The Faith and Politics Institute decades ago.

The institute works to bridge racial, spiritual, and other divides among elected officials. Among its board directors was the late U.S. Rep. John Lewis, the Georgia civil rights icon.

“When we shame people, we make them feel devalued and take away their dignity,” he said in a telephone interview.

“That’s different from inviting someone to a different perspective.”

He also said discussing the hurt caused by racially motivated statements helps with understanding.

“We need to find ways to speak to the pain that it causes — in a way that can touch hearts.”

That can’t happen, he said, if we decide to sequester ourselves from those who have different views.

“Maybe our way forward depends on getting close enough to each other to listen to each other — and to embrace a common future instead of a divided one.”

2022 or 2023. However, according to Congress’s Joint Committee on Taxation, the Inflation Reduction Act will increase the tax burden of most U.S. taxpayers.

These additional taxes come on top of inflation that most households are struggling to pay — and which is the result of excessive fiscal stimulus enacted by the Democrats in 2021.

Luria and her fellow Democrats are trying to ob-

fuscate the Joint Committee’s finding by noting that the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 also extends the Affordable Care Act subsidies which some taxpayers receive to lower the cost of health insurance.

What they fail to mention is that only a small proportion of taxpayers receive the ACA subsidies.

Even when those subsidies are taken into account, the Joint Committee found that 78% of taxpayers with incomes in the \$50,000 to \$75,000 range

will experience a tax increase in 2023.

For those in the \$75,000 to \$100,000 income range, 89% will experience a tax increase. Above \$100,000, virtually all taxpayers will see increases in taxes.

How to tell if a lying liar is lying to you

Ask the internet how you can tell if someone is lying, and you'll get tons of advice: Liars give too much information;

they give too little information. They won't look you in the eye; they hold your look too long. They stand very still; they fidget.

Not only is lie-detecting advice often contradictory, much of it is worthless. According to the FBI, "Despite the popular appeal

of body language, no study has uncovered any single behavior that accurately reflects whether a person is lying."

In analyzing the ways law enforce-

ment officers try to determine if someone is lying, the FBI found that the cognitive approach works: "The cognitive approach to deception is based on the idea that lying requires more mental resources than truth telling. The increase in mental load required to formulate and communicate a plausible story, monitor body language and emotional expressions, and anticipate future questions is believed to make liars vulnerable to additional questions they failed to anticipate."

In other words, keep asking questions and watch how hard the respondent must work and think and calculate to answer those questions and keep his emotions and reactions in check.

A compulsive or pathological liar lies to manipulate, out of habit, or from a deep-seated need to create lies even when those lies accomplish nothing and bring harm.

If you don't want to call someone a

pathological liar, you could say he is suffering from pseudologia phantastica, which psychiatrist Anton Delbrück came up with in 1891 for people who were such big fat liars that their lying, Delbrück thought, had to be caused by a mental condition.

In 1980, playwright Lillian Hellman sued novelist Mary McCarthy (and TV personality Dick Cavett and the Public Broadcasting Service) for \$2.5 million. On "The Dick Cavett Show," McCarthy repeated something she had said about Hellman several years before: "Every word she writes is a lie, including 'and' and 'the.'"

Winston Churchill said of a rival politician that you could tell he was lying when you saw his lips moving.

Less clever but more enduring is the classic playground chant, "Liar, liar, pants on fire."

The barb is said to have twin origins, the first being the biblical verse: "Thy

trousers, they burn with a fire as though from Heaven." Then William "Tyger Tyger, burning bright" Blake used the Bible quote for his poem, "The Liar," which included the verses, "Deceiver, dissembler, Your trousers are alight."

As Atlas Obscura explains, however, these origin stories are lies. There's no biblical verse about trousers burning with a fire from heaven and that poem about deceivers with trousers alight was written as a Blake parody.

It's likely that some schoolyard Shakespeare came up with "Liar, liar, pants on fire," which, like any great work of literature, underwent revisions. A second verse was added: "Hanging from a telephone wire." The 1960s rock band, The Castaways, in "Liar, Liar," insisted the second line should read "... nose as long as a telephone wire."

And if anyone is so childish as to say "Liar, liar, pants on fire" to us, we will reply with great dignity, "Don't care, don't care, buy another pair."

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

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Kalab Robinson's determination shows after crash

Kalab Robinson's rehabilitation is just beginning. And his determination is inspiring others.

"He keeps us going," said his mother, Maria Stevens. "His positivity throughout this has been our strength."

His goal now is to recover and "get back on that boat," Stevens said.

Robinson, a 20-year-old waterman, had finished practicing for a boat-docking contest in Cape Charles and was driving home Saturday, Aug. 6, when he suddenly lost consciousness and his vehicle crashed.

Robinson survived but his neck was broken. He was airlifted to Sentara Norfolk General Hospital.

Police initially reported that Robinson had fallen asleep at the wheel, but according to a doctor who treated him at the hospital, Robinson had passed out due to severe dehydration, said his mother.

Robinson's neck had broken in the center, at the C4 vertebrae of his spine, causing paralysis.

Following the referral of his doctor and his parents' research, Robinson was released from the hospital in late August and transferred to the Shepherd Center in Atlanta for rehabilitation.

For more than a month, Robinson has continued his rehabilitation efforts, supported by his mother and stepfather, Donnie Stevens, who have been staying in a hotel down the street from the rehab center.

In early November, Robinson should be ready to start a day program that will last for three to six weeks. He expects to be back home on the Eastern Shore before Christmas.

"I think that Kalab's attitude and strength throughout this has been amazing," his mother said. "Of course, it's not the plan that he had but he's figuring out a new one."

Mrs. Teresa "Tita" deGavre died peacefully at her home, Deep Creek Plantation, on Oct. 1, 2022. She was 108.

Tita was born in May 1914 in Oxford, England, the daughter of Gordon McLeod Cameron, a highly decorated officer in the Royal Navy, and Theresa Knowles Cameron. She grew up in Hayling Island in the south of England, sailing and exploring the Island's marshes. At an early age she became what would be termed today "a naturalist," perhaps a tomboy, with salt-water flowing through her veins.

In September 1937 she married Oliver Thompson, an officer with the Royal Sussex Regiment. She had first met him in 1928 on leave from India at his family home at Castlegarde in Ireland. They settled in Fairford in the Cotswolds and had two children, Timothy born in 1938 and Robert in 1940.

Following declaration of war in 1939, Oliver was sent to Northern France where he was badly wounded and evacuated through Dunkirk. Tita hoped that his war was over, but that was not to be. In 1943 he was ordered to North

Africa as commander of a battalion of the East Surrey Regiment. A year later, now in Italy, Lt. Colonel "Tommy" Thompson led his soldiers in a bloody cross-river assault on Monte Cassino. He was awarded Britain's second highest medal, the DSO (Distinguished Service Order), which was later personally given by King George VI to Thompson's son Timothy in Buckingham Palace.

In early June, he was killed in action near Rome. In recent years, Tita would recall the agony of coming downstairs at her home in Fairford and seeing on the dining room table a yellow telegram from the Ministry of Defense.

The war years were tough. Rationing made it difficult to feed her two boys. She joined laborers in the fields harvesting vegetables.

In 1946, Tita met Chet deGavre, a colonel in the U.S. Army, at a dance at a British military base. Chet was smitten and in the days that followed searched the nearby towns for the "widow Thompson." One Sunday afternoon he appeared at her Fairford home bearing a gift, a miniature shorebird he had carved.

Chet totally captivated Tita and in 1949 they were married near his home in New Jersey. As an Army wife, Tita lived in many locations. She remembered most fondly her years in Ethiopia – exploring, hunting, and camping in remote parts of the country. Tita painted, rode a donkey for days to the sunken churches of Lalibela, collected Coptic Christian crosses, fed her pet gazelles, dazzled the diplomatic parties, and dismissed the machine guns and mortars set up in her yard when the Ethiopian Army revolted.

In 1959, Tita purchased Deep Creek Plantation at auction. Deep Creek became her home and a dream realized. After Chet — now a brigadier general — retired in 1963, they both threw themselves into its restoration. Tita painted, wallpapered, embroidered, and created a magnificent garden of roses and flowers. Recognized for her experiments with organic gardening and the propagation of plants, she was awarded the coveted Horticulture

Award of Merit from the Garden Club of Virginia. The president of the Garden Club later wrote that "her striking beauty is something seen from the inside out."

Chet – besides pursuing his carving of waterfowl miniatures – built book cabinets and reproduction antique furniture and moved dilapidated ancient barns and dwellings onto the property and restored them. Deep Creek Plantation became the star attraction of the annual Garden Week tour. And squeezed among these busy days was time spent on the water boating, raising honeybees and sheep, enjoying their grandchildren, and worshipping at St. James Episcopal Church where Tita served for many years as its warden. These were very fulfilling times for both of them. And Chet and Tita adored and greatly respected each other.

As the years passed, Chet's health and mobility declined. His hands could no longer paint his miniature waterfowl carvings. In 1993 Chet passed away.

Many years later, she re-met Don Paradis, whom she and Chet had known in Ethiopia. He nurtured Tita's intellect and love for classical music. She moved into his retirement home in Collington, Md., in 2005, returning one week each month to her beloved Deep Creek. Five years later Don passed away and Tita promptly returned home.

In June 2018 Tita injured her hip and subsequently was confined to bed at Deep Creek. A group of exceptional ladies lovingly cared for her. Though physically diminished, she attracted universal warmth and respect. As Tita's minister wrote, "I so loved (her) clarity, her self-critical and inquisitive mind and such a passion for the life she inhabited, even as it has been in these later years."

Tita remained to the very end an original. It has been a God-given privilege for all who met her to have known her.

She is survived by her two sons, five grandchildren, a step-grandchild, and eight great-grandchildren.

A memorial celebration will be held at the St. James Episcopal Church in Accomac early next month, with specif-

ic information shared when available.

At age 25, have a clinical breast exam performed by your health care provider every three years, then yearly beginning age 40.

Mammograms

Begin annual screening mammograms at age 40; earlier if you are at high risk due to personal or family history. Consider tomosynthesis, otherwise known as a 3D mammogram.

Breast Self-Awareness

You know what is normal for your breasts. A change does not always indicate breast cancer. Still, be alert for the following:

- A lump in the breast or under the arm
- Skin changes, including a dimple, redness, or thickening
- Change in breast shape or size
- Nipple discharge
- Scaling or redness of the nipple and/or areola
- Nipple retraction or deviation
- New breast pain

If you notice any of these signs or something that doesn't look or feel quite right, notify your health care provider immediately.



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Shore's opioid death rates should begin conversation

The death rate due to opioid overdose for Northampton County was 25.7% and Accomack County was 12.4% in 2020, according to the Virginia Department of Health.

September was National Opioid Awareness Month. The Centers for Disease Control define an “opioid” as a natural, synthetic, or semi-synthetic chemical that interacts with the opioid receptors on nerve cells in the body and brain that reduce the intensity of pain signals and feelings of pain.

This class of pain-relieving drugs include, heroin, and fentanyl, and even prescriptions such as oxycodone, hydrocodone, codeine, morphine, and many others.

Prescriptions opioids are generally considered safe to use for a short period of time and when under supervision of a doctor, however, because it produces a euphoric state in the body, overuse can lead to the potential of addiction.

Anyone who takes a prescription opioid has the potential to become addicted. When opioids are taken in at an excessive rate, there then becomes a risk of an overdose death. Seventy-five percent of all overdose deaths in 2020 involved an opioid.

In a tight-knit community like the Eastern Shore, it can be easy to adopt the “it would never happen here” mentality. But statistics show the opioid epidemic is, in fact, “happening here.”

So now the question becomes: What can we do about it? One of the easiest things that we can do is to start talking about it.

The more we talk about opioids and their addictive potential and the side effects of abuse and misuse, the

less stigmatizing it becomes. This potentially can make it easier for those suffering from a substance use disorder to seek out help.

We can also make ourselves more aware of the resources that are available in our community such as safe prescription medication disposal boxes that are available at several police stations on the Shore, as well as medication disposal bags available for free at the Community Services Board Prevention Office in Belle Haven.

These pouches are easy to use and the most effective way to discard old or unused prescription medications. The Community Services Board office of Prevention also offers “REVIVE!” opioid overdose reversal training courses. These courses teach about how to recognize the signs of an overdose, how to administer Narcan, as well as how to get appropriate professional help. This course takes about an hour to complete.

Did you know that the Community Services Board also offers substance use outpatient services at its two Parksley locations on Dunne Avenue and Greenbush Road? They are staffed by one dually credentialed licensed clinician, one licensed eligible clinician and one Certified Substance Abuse Counselor.

Additional supports are also offered to individuals such as Case Management, Peer Recovery Services, and even Medicated Assisted Recovery supports.

When an ATON needs attention

Today's column will focus on questions we have received, so the topics we address will hopefully be of great interest. We plan to provide first names only but you will know if it is your question.

Don, Sam, and Amy all asked us how to find out about Aids to Navigation alerts each week.

It's fairly straightforward. Whenever a boater sees a problem with an Aid to Navigation – things like the aid is not where it should be, a day board or numbers are missing the aid is sinking or leaning more than 15 degrees, the lights are out or not working properly, the boater should take a picture of the problem ATON, write down the location and then contact the local Aid to Navigation team.

On the Eastern Shore this team is located on Chincoteague, or those concerned can call a Coast Guard Auxiliant.

Once the aid problem is reported, the Coast Guard team will report the problem to the Navigation Center. The problem you report is then sent out via an email notice. We get the notices every day, note the ones near us, and report them to you. The following week the notices are reported in the Local Notice to Mariners where they remain until repaired. That's how we get them; it's a free service. Any boater can register to receive these notices by searching under the Coast Guard Navigation Center and registering.

Hall's dream is to be an orthopedic surgeon and come back to the Eastern Shore to practice medicine.

Although Hall has no intention of pursuing a sports-related career, he has not ruled out the possibility of playing football at the collegiate level.

“I will look at my options,” he said. “And if one of my options allows me to play football, then I will happily accept it.”

Benefit thrift store opens Saturday

Betty Mariner has been in constant motion — sorting donations, getting them in shape, and pricing them — in preparation for the grand opening of Dos Santos Thrift Store at 25377B Lankford Highway, Onley, on Saturday, Oct. 8, from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Dos Santos, “two saints” in Spanish, started as an after-school tutoring program for Hispanic elementary students and a support group for their mothers.

The Rev. Cameron Randle and Angelica Garcia Randle of St. James and St. George Episcopal churches founded the program. Mariner now runs the program.

Mariner wasn't looking to open a thrift store, but since Dos Santos Food Pantry had outgrown its storage area at St. George's Church, donated space was given in Four Corners Plaza. Now it has moved to the new location.

“We'd do a food distribution at St. George's in Pungoteague. People would donate clothing, and we'd put it out during the distribution,” said Mariner.

“When the pandemic hit, I did a survey to find out where people were com-

ing from to receive food. Some were traveling 40 miles round trip. So, we decided to open a site at Candellero de Oro in Parksley and at Christ Church in Eastville. Twelve core volunteers serve 300 people a month.”

She calls the new shop a “thrift-ique.” It's a designer arrangement of economically priced clothing, housewares, furniture, jewelry, even a children's room.

Mariner, her husband, Peter, and daughter, Susan, have been working to transform the space.

“I have always had a soft spot in my heart for people who are new to the area, especially who don't speak English,” said Mariner.

Dos Santos Thrift Store will be open Wednesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Fridays from 1 to 7 p.m. For the grand opening, there will be a parking lot furniture sale.

Culvert replacement is scheduled

Beginning as early as Oct. 10, contractor crews with the Virginia Department of Transportation are scheduled to begin implementing lane closures under flagger control on Route 695, Saxis Road, between Matthews Road and Hammock Road in Accomack County, as part of a culvert replacement project underway.

Curtis Contracting Inc. was awarded the nearly \$2.1 million construction contract to replace 14 culverts along a 2.5-mile section of the causeway heading into the town of Saxis.

The contractor will have a flagging operation in place alternating each direction of traffic at a time, scheduled to take place weekdays between 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The work is anticipated to be complete in spring 2023. This work is weather-dependent, and the schedule is subject to change.

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
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

British author’s book traces her family from England to the Shore

Virginia.

Among the highlights of the trip for Rice was staying in a cottage on Bayview Farm, on Old Plantation Creek, on 400 acres formerly owned by Bagwell and now owned by Merle and Bob Starer.

When the Rices arrived, they sat outside on a deck and surveyed the scene before them.

“You talk about emotion. We looked out on what Henry would have seen, because ... nothing’s changed. ... I felt emotional, appreciative of his journey,” Rice said.

Margaret Rice also made a trip to Eastville to view the oldest continuous court records in the United States, including some signed by her ancestor.

The retired teacher, from Tiverton, England, set out a decade ago to trace the genealogy of her family, the Chappells, of Exeter, a city in southwest England.

British author Margaret A. Rice finally got her chance to visit the Eastern Shore, the place to which her distant ancestor came from England in the early 1600s.

Rice’s book, “The Henry Bagwell Story: English Adventurer, Virginia Planter, 1589-1663,” published in 2021, recounts the story of her ancestor, who was the first Northampton County Clerk of Court and an early member of the Virginia House of Burgesses.

The book was awarded the bronze medal for regional nonfiction in the 2022 Independent Publisher Book Awards.

Rice’s planned visit to the United States upon the book’s publication was delayed as result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Last week, she and her husband, Ray, finally made the trip, her first to

Her research resulted in discovery of her relation to Henry Bagwell, the second son of a wealthy British merchant family and an adventurer who left England in 1609 at age 20 to settle in Virginia.

He was shipwrecked in Bermuda along the way, in an incident scholars say inspired William Shakespeare to write his play, "The Tempest."

Bagwell and the others left stranded in Bermuda built new ships and after nine months continued on to Jamestown.

Bagwell later made his way to the Eastern Shore, where in addition to being clerk of court, he also served on the vestry of Hungars Church.

Rice's book is the first published biography of Henry Bagwell.

To find details about Bagwell's life, Rice used records in England and Virginia, including archives of the Eastern Shore Public Library, the Library of Virginia, Northampton County Circuit

Rice hopes to also visit Bermuda, the site where Henry Bagwell was shipwrecked, and where an annual commemoration of the "Sea Venture" shipwreck is held.

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



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

community.

Robinson's employer, Scott Wivell, organized a benefit seafood steam and silent auction that brought in about \$45,000. Local watermen donated the seafood for the event.

Stevens said Wivell has been "more than a boss ... a good friend," and Robinson was "grateful and surprised" at the gesture.

Robinson's family held separate fundraisers at Indiantown Park and on Facebook, bringing the total donations to about \$70,000, Stevens said.

"I've had a lot of support from all of my family and friends and the whole Eastern Shore community, really. ... Everybody's been there for me through this whole thing," Robinson said. "I ap-

preciate all their support."

He became a waterman not quite a year ago after he saw an advertisement for the position on Facebook.

The job appealed to him because he had grown up on the Shore hunting and fishing, his stepfather also worked on the water, and the pay was good.

"I ... just fell in love with working on the water and being out there every day," Robinson said.

There's a possibility that Robinson may never walk again, but if he does, a full recovery could take as long as two years.

But Robinson has his mind set on returning to what he loves, not worrying about the future or making a back-up plan.

He said, "I really haven't thought about it that much. I plan on recovering as much as I can."

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
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
