# 'I enjoyed seeing the patients'

Dr. John Snyder, now retired, reflects on a career spent here

Dr. John Snyder is one of the last of a generation of Eastern Shore physicians who started in the profession making house calls and keeping all-paper records.

After decades of serving the community as a general practitioner, the doctor who grew up on a farm is retreating to a farm near Franktown to retire.

Snyder was raised in Marionville, about two miles from Nassawadox. He loved being outdoors and enjoyed fishing and hunting, although he did not believe for long that he would become a farmer like his father. A different career called him.

Dr. John Rogers Mapp was a radiologist at the Northampton-Accomack Me-



"You are both so gracious and generous and always present wonderful art, programs, and entertainment for the community to enjoy," wrote Jacqueline Smith of the gallery's owner, Clelia Sheppard, and manager, Mary Ann Roehm.

Others, however, are complaining about the noise and say the block parties negatively impact nearby businesses.



of necessity during the COVID-19 pandemic, when public indoor gatherings were restricted and the gallery sought a way to continue connecting the community with the arts.

Each live music event was held outside the gallery on Mason Avenue and the intersecting Strawberry Street.

Mason Avenue, Cape Charles' main street, was closed on select Fridays for what were essentially block parties celebrating the arts.

The events were not held regularly in 2021, but they became so popular that Lemon Tree had one every Friday during the summer of 2022, with the exceptions of the Fridays before Memorial Day and Labor Day.

But when Lemon Tree applied for a permit to hold Friday Nights at Lemon Tree weekly this summer, pushback from neighboring businesses convinced the gallery to withdraw its application.

# Opposition speaks

Some of that opposition was voiced at the Cape Charles Town Council meeting on May 18.

Amy Butta, president of the Wilson building

condominiums across the street from the gallery, said the live music events are a major disturbance and inconvenience to residents, many of whom are elderly.

If residents leave home and don't return before the road is closed for the event, they have to park their vehicles far from their building and walk the rest of the way home, which is especially difficult for residents in their 70s, 80s, or 90s, Butta pointed out.

During the event, the music is so loud the residents can't even watch television, she added.

Mason Avenue shop and restaurant owners, including cafe owner Cristina Carollo, complained that their businesses suffer during the live music events.

She was concerned about people coming from Lemon Tree and bringing open containers of alcohol into her restaurant.

Carollo did not want to risk the restaurant losing its alcoholic beverage license.

# 'Figure this out'

But there were as many or more public speakers who supported Lemon Tree Gallery's live music offerings.

"We should be thanking Lemon Tree for bringing the arts to Cape Charles," said Melinda Blanchard. Connie Adams told the town council, "I urge you not to ban live music" at the gallery.

Town Manager John Hozey clarified that the town council does not grant or deny event permits; those decisions are made at the staff level.

Neither was Lemon Tree Gallery on the agenda, but Hozey said he and the Town Council would speak about the matter later in the meeting.

He noted that the gallery offered live music every Friday last summer with no complaints, but "sometimes success is its own worst enemy."

Roehm explained that the event permit application was withdrawn to avoid conflict, but after hearing all the support for the gallery she would consider resubmitting the application.

Town Council members said they believed a compromise was possible and pointed out that other local groups, such as Citizens For Central Park, hold major events like its summer concert series, yet they manage to keep peace with the neighbors.

Hozey recommended Lemon Tree Gallery start by speaking with the director of Cape Charles Main Street, which represents the interests of the businesses in town, and the heads of the two homeowners associations of the condominiums on Mason Avenue.

"We've got to be able to figure this out," he said.

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"Throughout his tenure the senator dedicated himself to issues near and dear to Shore citizens," CBES said in a press release.


"He did so with decorum and a practice of working across the aisle for the good of his constituents, an anomaly in today's divisive politics."

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# Town mulls lower speed limits; Market Street will be adjusted

Onancock is considering lowering the speed limit on several roads.

The public can provide input on the proposed changes that would drop speed limits to 25 mph on some streets during a public hearing planned for the next town council meeting June 26.

The changes would lower speed limits on Hill Street, which runs past the cemetery; Liberty Street, which connects to Hill Street on the other side of the cemetery; and the portions of Market Street marked 30 and 35 mph, starting around Hall Street and continuing into town, said Town Manager Matt Spuck said.

"Not all of our businesses can be supported by our golf carts and that started a conversation about where people can go and how they can get there," Spuck

Golf carts are only allowed on streets marked up to 25 mph.

Market Street is scheduled to be restriped through a "road diet" next year that will make it a two-lane road with bike shoulders and a center turn lane, so "that probably makes more sense to have this 25" mph speed limit there, Spuck said.

While some council members applauded the proposed changes, others asked whether it will benefit many residents.

"It seems that we're making a change specifically for golf carts, which I would guess are a small proportion of the vehicles on the road," Councilmember Cindy Holdren said.

"We're trying to make it more pedestrian friendly, more bike friendly,"

## **Cindy Holdren Onancock Town Council**

Mayor Fletcher Fosque said. "To me, 25 is just a safer ... (speed limit) for everyone."

If the council approves the changes, residents would have a 30-day signed warning period that the speed limits will change.

There would be another 30 days of "benevolent enforcement" after the speed limits change, Spuck said.

# Community Services Board's 32-hour workweek is logical

The Eastern Shore Community Services Board is trying a 32-hour workweek as a way to recruit and retain employees. The thinking goes: If an Eastern Shore agency can't compete with other areas on salaries, having more time off could be an attractive amenity.

While the local initiative took some scheduling management and is a test run, a 32-hour work week has worked well elsewhere.

We eagerly await the reaction and results of the trial period. In the meantime, we think it is a great idea — and an idea other agencies, governments, and businesses should consider.

The fact is, workers on the Eastern Shore could earn better pay just about anywhere else. But they trade their earning potential to live in a special community with a strong sense of place.

Living and working on the Eastern Shore of Virginia means you place more importance on your lifestyle and surroundings than your pay rate.

At the community services board, employees now will get the same pay at 32 hours as they did at 40 hours. It is fascinating to consider how someone might spent those extra eight hours per week.

Maybe it means achieving a better work-life balance — investing more time in self-care and with family and friends.

But maybe it means more time to volunteer at the ballfield, the church, or with civic activities — investing more time in important community endeavors.

The community services board's 32-hour workweek has the potential not only to retain and attract workers, but also to make a positive impact on the Eastern Shore.

# June 2 to 4 are national gun violence awareness days

To the editor:

The first time in my life that I was touched by gun violence was in 1977.

A young couple in Mansfield, Pa., just starting out in life, were my friends and neighbors.

The husband, who was 26 years old, was a state police officer. He was called to a home for a domestic violence issue.

He knocked on the door and when it was opened, he was shot and killed instantly. He died in the line of duty.

His young wife — my friend — was grief stricken.

I remember her clutching her small dog and asking over and over again, "Why?"

Nobody had answers for that. It was a tragedy.

Many years have passed but more recently I experienced another more deeply personal instance of gun violence when a family member was a victim of armed robbery.

She is very fortunate that she survived, but the trauma that

these events leave on those most affected is heart-wrenching.

It is post-traumatic stress disorder, or PTSD — you just can't go on as though nothing happened, because it is there when you least expect it.

The trauma comes rushing back. It's always there.

I bring this up because June 2 to 4 are days set aside to wear orange in honor of victims of gun violence.

As recent history will show you, there is more than enough gun violence.

I am asking you to wear orange and I am asking that you encourage everyone in your community to do the same.

Contact your town council and ask that they declare June 2 to 4 as gun violence awareness days and to wear orange.

Here are some reasons why — many you have heard before:

Firearms are the leading cause of death for children and teens in America.

Access to a gun triples the risk of death by suicide.

In all, 4.6 million children in the U.S. live in homes with guns that are both loaded and unlocked.

Please join us in honoring victims and encouraging others to support them.

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# A Memorial Day look at the forgotten Wallops Navy death toll

On the morning of April 2, 1957, a U.S. Navy aircraft took off from Chincoteague Naval Auxiliary Air Station, which today is the NASA Wallops Flight Facility, with 11 military servicemen on board.

The weather was described as a misty drizzle and the

airplane, on a routine trip to North Carolina, lost power, according to newspaper accounts.

It crashed minutes later in a freshly plowed farm field in Atlantic, just a few miles away from the airstrip where it took off. There were no survivors.

The servicemen on the flight hailed from all over the country — Missouri, New York, West Virginia, Oklahoma. Some lived on Chincoteague Island or on the air station base with their spouses.

George Stracka of Pennsylvania, one of the men on the flight, told his wife he'd be home the next Friday.

"He arrived on Friday in a casket," said Stracka's son, James, in a telephone interview this week from his Florida home. He was 9 years old when his father died.

On Memorial Day, the Eastern Shore honors its residents who gave their lives while serving in the U.S. armed forces. Their names are posted on our courthouse walls and other memorial displays.

And then there are others who had no connection to our area but died on the Eastern Shore while serving in the armed forces.

These tragedies are largely forgotten — no plagues, no markers, and no evidence that the blood of our military was spilled on our own soil, right under our noses. There are only newspaper clippings to remind us.

I've often wondered why the Naval base currently at Wallops doesn't pick up the mantle, research and compile the local military fatalities, and publicly memorialize those servicemen who died in our area.

And these fatalities still happen.

One year ago, Navy Lt. Hyrum Hanlon, 27, a native of Arizona, was fatally injured when his airplane crashed near Chincoteague while conducting routine exercises out of the Wallops Flight Facility.

But during the time of the Chincoteague Naval Air Station, which closed in 1959, military deaths were frequent on the Eastern Shore as airplanes repeatedly dropped out of the sky.

On Memorial Day in 1944, 11 Navy servicemen attached to the Chincoteague station died when their aircraft crashed into the woods a mile and a half from the Wallops base.

A witness said the aircraft sheared off treetops

for 100 yards before making impact.

The victims again were from all over the map servicemen from Utah, Iowa, Maine, Florida, and more whose lives ended in Accomack County.

On June 19, 1944, 10 naval personnel were killed when an airplane attached to the Chincoteague base crashed four miles southwest of the air station.

Three more naval airmen died Nov. 23, 1945, when two planes attached to the station collided a mile west of Chincoteague.

Two more Navy fliers died in a crash near Horntown, several miles north of the base, on May 20, 1943.

By my count, that's 38 dead servicemen from six crashes, each in Accomack County, and each impact just a couple of miles from Wallops. It's a horrible, sobering statistic. And it's an incomplete list.

Not only are those crashes largely ignored today, some of families of the victims don't know exactly where the crashed happened.

Stracka, whose father perished in the 1957 crash, said only within the past few years did he realize his father was based at Chincoteague. He thought the crash happened in the Norfolk area.

"I see him every day," Stracka said of his father. "I have his picture on my bureau and another one in my office."

# Far too many of our veterans lose their battle with drug addiction

This Memorial Day, millions of American families will take time to honor the memories of the men and women who lost their lives fighting in one of the nation's wars. It can be a challenging day for veterans at home.

Outside of this day, however, we must never forget the countless veterans who lose their lives to addiction, drug overdose, or suicide. In Virginia are over 700,000 veterans, most of whom are wartime vets.

According to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, over 3.9 million veterans have a substance use disorder or mental illness.

Additionally, substance use disorders significantly increase suicidality among veterans. Suicidal thoughts and behaviors are also common among veterans ages 18 to 49.

"Early intervention is critical, and it does save lives. Yet, it is challenging for families to know what to say or understand why this is happening, along with finding the right help," said Michael Leach of Addicted.org

There is no simple answer to why veterans become addicted to drugs or alcohol. Yet, there are numerous causative factors. Many veterans experience financial hardships and difficulty finding employment or accessing benefits.

Veterans are at a higher risk of developing mental and emotional health problems. This can also be compounded with physical injuries or chronic pain. Untreated trauma, for example, leads to mental health issues or

Veterans also face barriers when ac-

cessing treatment. This could involve the cost of help or gaps in health insurance. Stigma regarding addiction is still a problem. Veterans in rural areas have limited access to treatment, and there is often inadequate funding.

However, outside of the standard resources provided by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and the VA facility locator, other supports include:

- The Virginia Department of Veterans Services offers different supports and resources to vets and their families
- Virginia Supportive Housing is a program for veterans to help prevent homelessness
- Helpful hotlines include the Veterans Crisis Line, 1-800-273-8255, and the Lifeline for Vets. 1-888-777-4443

SAMHSA has a treatment facility locator where veterans can narrow down options for substance use treatment.

Families also play a significant role in supporting their loved ones and intervening. It's OK to express concern about their drug or alcohol use. Speak to them openly and honestly about their addiction. Help them find treatment. Be patient and show compassion for what they are experiencing.

It's never too late to offer a helping hand. When communities and families come together, amazing things happen. Advocate for more community resources in urban and rural areas. Speak up and help those veterans who are struggling.

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# Public exhortations continue about town pavilion, school

Historic Onancock School dominated public comment during the Onancock Town Council meeting Monday, May 22.

Though council members did not discuss the performance pavilion at HOS during the meeting, several residents shared their views on the arts and community center that has become the subject of contention since groundbreaking on the pavilion occurred last November.

The pavilion is a project by Friends of Onancock School, which operates the nonprofit HOS. FOS recently provided a three-page Pavilion Operational Guidelines document to the town council outlining proposed management of the pavilion when it is completed.

Mark Sinclair called the proposed guidelines "insufficient." He also urged the town to "make a long-term commitment" to donate funds for repairs needed at HOS.

Beth Temple proposed creating an Onancock commons "managed for a community benefit" at the former school. She called the guidelines FOS created for the pavilion "great."

Kasey Grier echoed Temple's sug-

gestion to create a town commons and asked Onancock to consider comprehensive planning for the HOS property.

"There's never really been a comprehensive consideration of the site as a whole," Grier said.

"Whatever happens with the proposed (pavilion) structure, the property needs to be regarded in a more holistic kind of way," she said.

Patsy Felthousen drew similarities between Onancock's performance pavilion and the Music on the Half Shell Stage in Kilmarnock, a similarly sized town on the Chesapeake Bay's western shore.

"This entire community has the opportunity to create something beautiful that everyone can enjoy," she said of the pavilion.

FOS obtained the necessary permits and received a vote of support from the town council before beginning pavilion construction but the project met controversy when neighbors expressed concerns about issues from traffic and crowd control to noise, bathroom facilities, alcohol sales, trash removal, and potential vandalism of the venue.

FOS has paused pavilion construction while the community reaches consensus on how performances can coexist with neighbors' way of life.

# Effort afoot here to recruit, train local pregancy counselors

A Richmond-based group is expanding to the Eastern Shore to help improve pregnancy outcomes for local residents.

The group, called Birth in Color, will host its first training for a new group of community-based doulas — non-medical professionals who support pregnant people before, during, and after birth —on the Eastern Shore June 14-16.

Those interested in the training should register by June 1 by visiting www.birthincolorhamptonroads.org to be considered for the program.

Birth in Color focuses on narrowing racial disparities in pregnancy outcomes for Black women, but applicants of all backgrounds are welcome to apply for the training program and support from Birth in Color's community-based doulas, said the group's founder and Executive Director Kenda Sutton-El.

"There's no real manual that comes with childbirth, but you can be ready for what's to come," Sutton-El said.

"The goal is always to decrease the maternal mortality rates but also to educate people in childbirth and be ready for it," she said.

# Combatting mortality rates

Doulas are professionals trained to provide emotional, physical, and informational support to women throughout their pregnancy, birth, and postpartum periods. They assist with births both at home and in the hospital.

Sutton-El founded Birth in Color in 2018 to help combat maternal mortality rates, which are significantly higher for Black women than the overall population.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Black women are three times more likely to die from a pregnancy-related cause than white women.

Only about 10% of the country's

doulas are Black, according to a 2023 article by the New York Times, but they can play an important role in narrowing the gap in health disparities in their communities.

Doulas are not only trained in techniques such as birthing positions that can speed labor and ease pain, but can also advocate for patients from their own communities, said Charmaine Henry, who recently completed Birth in Color's doula training program in Hampton Roads.

She has worked as a certified medical assistant in maternal-fetal medicine for over 20 years and said her

Black patients have "a lot of unanswered questions" about pregnancy and childbirth.

"We're there to support, to educate, to advocate, to help them with resources and things that they may need during their pregnancy," Henry said of community-based doulas.

"I want to be a part of helping them advocate for themselves," she said.

# Improving outcomes

Data from the American Journal of Obstetricians and Gynecologists shows the constant presence of support personnel such as a doula is one of the most effective tools to improve labor and delivery outcomes.

Studies have found women receiving doula support were less likely to need pain medication during birth, less likely to have a cesarean birth, and had shorter labor times — factors that make a smooth transition to mother-hood more likely.

A doula is "the only person that doesn't change with birth. If your doctor isn't on call, then you don't get the doctor that you've been seeing the entire time" during pregnancy, Sutton-El said.

She founded Birth in Color to help families and communities navigate pregnancy-related experiences and provide support and education for those who need it the most.

That is why she is expanding Birth in Color to Virginia's Eastern Shore.

"It is really a rural community in that they don't have a lot when it comes to education surrounding pregnancy — both before and after. When we look for a community, that's what we look for," Sutton-El said.

# No experience necessary

No experience is necessary to apply for Birth in Color's Eastern Shore training program, said Sequoi Phipps-Hawkins, Birth in Color's director of communications and marketing.

"You truly learn everything that you need to know through the training," she said.

Applicants will undergo an interview to ensure they understand what a doula is before they are accepted into the program, she said.

The training begins with three full days of in-person instruction by Sutton-El June 14 to 16 at a location to be determined on the Eastern Shore.

Virtual trainings will follow and trainees will connect with a mentor for four to six weeks of additional train-

ing before attending their first training birth, Phipps-Hawkins said.

After a series of training births, trainees become Birth in Color and Virginia State-Certified Doulas, Sutton-El said. Birth in Color helps connect them with clients for part- or full-time doula work once they are certified.

Applicants do not need a medical background and trainees of all ethnicities and backgrounds are welcomed, she said.

"We actually want everyone to utilize these services. We just want to make sure that people of color actually are paying attention ... and feel comfortable with coming," Sutton-El

Birth in Color has several bilingual doulas and translation services, she said.

Pregnant people seeking a community-based doula can contact Birth in Color through its website. Doula funding on the Eastern Shore exists through Medicaid, though Sutton-El said she has reached out to the local Department of Health to discuss other types of funding assistance, similar to the services Richmond's Health District provides Birth in Color clients.

"We're there to help them to be able to ask their medical providers questions about their pregnancy so they know that they can get the information that they need ... to ensure that they have a safe and healthy birth and delivery," Henry said of community-based doulas.

"I think every woman deserves a doula," she said.

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

morial Hospital, and his wife, Sarah Mapp, was a substitute teacher at Snyder's school, Birdsnest Elementary.

She must have had a sixth sense about Snyder's future, because when he told her he was going to be a farmer like his dad, she replied, "No, you're going to be a doctor."

His primary care provider was Dr. Wayne Mears, of Belle Haven, "one of those who did it all," Snyder said.

Watching his doctor apply extensive medical knowledge and skills as he cared for patients, "you felt like you were in the presence of something special," Snyder said.

He was inspired — and the job appealed to him because there was no "paper pushing" and doctors can immediately see the impact of their work.

Moreover, there was "a big need on the Shore" for doctors, Snyder said.

That became even more apparent after he graduated from medical school, completed his internship and residency, and returned to the Eastern Shore in 1982 to join the practice of Dr. Ernest Gibb and Dr. Edmund Henderson.

The three, all Eastern Shore natives, had to be flexible and versatile, following overfilled schedules to provide all types of care due to a lack of specialists like obstetricians. The three doctors delivered babies, made house calls, held Saturday morning office hours, and worked in the hospital.

They had no computers to make life easier; all of their patients' charts and prescriptions were on paper.

"I was just turning 30 and thought we could cure the world," Snyder said. adding that in those days, he typically survived on a couple hours of sleep every night.

Then the dominoes began to fall. Dr. Bill Burton, of Chincoteague, cut back his practice. Dr. William Wingfield, of Keller, fell ill and died. Dr. John Francis and others moved, leaving the Shore's remaining physicians to pick up the pieces.

"It was an absolute zoo," Snyder said.

Some relief came a few months later when Dr. Arthur Carter came to the Eastern Shore and lightened the obstetric load. Around that time, Dr. David Scott and Dr. Brad Fears also started their work on the Shore.

Working long hours as a doctor in a low-income, rural area inevitably presented some challenges to the husband and father, but Bleak House, a 19th century, two-story, white home in Franktown that Snyder purchased in 1984, was a "good place to raise three kids," he said.

His wife, Ann Snyder, stayed home and took care of the house and kids while he was working.

It also helped that "I enjoyed seeing the patients and enjoyed what I was doing," Snyder said.

None of his children followed in his footsteps after seeing how hard he worked for a "relatively poor income."

But when Riverside Medical Group took over the hospital around 2009, it was a "huge help to all of us," Snyder said.

The doctors who joined the medical group received good reimbursements and benefits, he said.

Earning a living as a doctor is even more difficult now, which makes it tough for the Eastern Shore to recruit and retain qualified physicians. Snyder graduated from college essentially debtfree, but paying for medical school today is basically taking out a mortgage, and graduating with \$200,000 in debt is not uncommon, he said.

He also believes rural areas are tough sells for young doctors who grew up in cities and suburbs and "can't imagine living like this," away from neighbors and shopping centers.


Snyder planned to retire around age 70, and that's just what he did. He left his practice in December 2022, and he and his wife decided to downsize and sold Bleak House.

They now live on farm land just a few miles from their old home. The Snyders own 120 acres, much of which is rented out to farmers who grow corn, soybeans, "a little bit of everything," Snyder said.

In his retirement, he looks forward to activities like fishing, boating, reading for pleasure, and taking long walks with the dog.

It was "always my dream to have farm land," Snyder said, and now he has it on his native Eastern Shore.

He said, "I couldn't imagine living anywhere else."

# Sparrow wins Hook N' Hose Black Drum Tournament

The first cobia of the season have made their appearance in the lower Chesapeake Bay, but anglers will



Bill Hall have to wait awhile before they are legally able to keep one of the hard-fishing gamefish. The 2023 recreational cobia season opens on June 15 and will run through September 15. Anglers will be allowed one

fish per person, with a two-fish per vessel possession limit and a prohibition on gaffing. The minimum size will be 40 inches total length with one fish allowed on a vessel measuring longer than 50 inches total length.

# Upper Shore

Captain Matt Abell, of the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported that despite the winds of the previous week, he was able to land a combination of red drum, striped bass, and speckled trout during a recent charter on the bayside shallows. Most of the fish were landed using paddletail soft plastics fished under popping corks. Black drum catches were reported by anglers fishing crab and clam baits in deeper water over the shelly bottoms of Pocomoke Sound.

Anglers fishing the seaside for flounder did not make out as well during the windy conditions, which produced muddy water conditions. In between blows, flounder were landed by anglers drifting Berkley Gulp tipped with either silversides or live minnows.

# Chincoteague

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, described the recent week's fishing as "a bit tough!" On the bright side, good numbers of kingfish (whiting) continue to take up residency in the Assateague Island surf, as well as the first spot of the season. A 7-foot-long sand tiger shark was caught and released in the surf and several other "toothy critters" were hooked, but lost, according to Vasiliou. He advised anglers to rig up with steel leaders if they are interested in trying to target and land one of the many species of shark available in the surf. Flounder are still available in the back bay, while whiting catches are coming near the inlet.

# Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul told me that flounder fishing was "kind of tough" last week due to the windy conditions. He added that the fishing was good when the conditions were more favorable. Most of the anglers out of Wachapreague were using Gulp and live minnow combinations for bait and employing a two-hook leader. Captain Paul added that there were still a "few" drum available in the surf near the inlet but he anticipated that those fish would be leaving the area soon. A spokesperson at the Wachapreague Inn echoed that the recent windy weather made it tough fishing for most of their guests. However, those persistent enough to put in their time caught fish during the periods when the winds subsided.

# Lower Shore

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle in Cape Charles, reported that un-

cooperative weather limited angling productivity last week. Strong east winds produced strong currents and dirty water. Most lower Shore anglers who ventured out were in pursuit of black drum.

Despite the conditions, black drum were caught out of Oyster and behind Fisherman Island on peeler crab and clam baits. A few large red drum were mixed in with the black drum, providing some extra action. Flounder fishing was described as poor due to the dirty water conditions. Sand mullet (whiting) catches came from the area around the concrete ships, while the nearby lower Shore piers produced catches of small gray trout and whiting. A few catches of speckled trout came from the lower bayside creeks

# A winner is crowned

Koby Sparrow had the largest catch in the Cape Charles Fire Company's inaugural Hook N' Hose Black Drum Tournament. Sparrow's winning fish tipped the scales at 63 pounds, 4 ounces. Ethan Willett finished in second place with a drum weighing 59 pounds, 4 ounces; and Ronnie Marshall took third place with a fish weighing 55 pounds, 2 ounces. The youth division was won by Mason Horner with a fish weighing 37 pounds, 3 ounces.

Kyler Leblanc finished 15th in the triple jump.






