# Local agency tries 32-hour workweek

Community Services Board initiative aims to help recruitment, retention

A local agency serving the Eastern Shore is testing a 32-hour workweek as a way to improve employee retention and recruitment and create better work-life balance.

The Eastern Shore Community Services Board began phasing in the trial run of its new policy in April and plans to implement the schedule across all of its departments in early June, said Executive Director MiMi Sedjat.

The CSB will do a test run of the schedule for 180 days before its board of directors re-visits the policy, she said.

"We figured if we did a 32-hour work week ... that would give people a better work-life balance," Sedjat said of the new, temporary policy.

The CSB will remain open during its regular

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# County gets \$16.8M from state for high school project

Northampton County Public Schools will receive \$16.8 million in state funding to help pay for renovations and new construction at the building that houses its high and middle schools, a project that was last estimated to cost around \$84 million.

"This is definitely closing that \$30 million gap," said Superintendent Lisa Martin, who shared the news of the grant award on May 11.

When the project reached the 95% design completion phase in spring 2022, the estimated construction cost was only \$52 million.

The cost rose to about \$61.5 million when including "soft costs" like engineering, construction manage-

ment, and classroom furnishings.

The project was put out to bid with the expectation that the county would pay no more than \$65 million to comolete it.

The Northampton School Board and county supervisors were shocked when the low bid was more than \$84 million.

An opportunity for financial relief came in the form of a bill Gov. Glenn Youngkin signed into law in August 2022.

Through the bill, the Virginia General Assembly created the School Construction Assistance Program, which started with \$400 million from the state's general fund and \$50 million from the Literary Fund.

Local school boards must "demonstrate poor building conditions, commitment, and need for such school boards to fund the construction, expansion, or modernization of public school buildings" to qualify, according to a Feb. 24 memo from then-Superin-

tendent of Public Instruction Jillian Balow.

School divisions that qualify receive 10%, 20%, or 30% of approved construction costs not exceeding \$100 million, meaning the maximum possible award is \$30 million.

Northampton's grant of \$16.8 million is 20% of the \$84 million high school project cost, the ninth largest grant awarded.

The application process was competitive and only 40 of 119 applications, or less than half, were approved.

The Virginia Department of Education held a special meeting the morning of May 11 to announce the grant awards.

Martin said when school administrators at the central office heard Northampton's grant announced, "There were a lot of cheers here."

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
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

hours — 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Its all-day, every-day services will remain available during the trial, Sedjat said.

To do this, policy developers borrowed from existing models and looked internally for input from supervisors of the CSB's different programs, she said.

For some staff, the 32-hour workweek will mean four eight-hour workdays each week, while others will work four 6.5-hour days and one six-hour day per week, "depending on the needs of the clients that are served in that program," Sedjat said.

Staff will work staggered hours to ensure the CSB remains open during its regular hours.

### Several reasons

CSB leaders decided to try the 32-hour workweek for several reasons, including employee retention and recruitment; quality of life for employees; and quality of services they provide to between 2,200 and 2,700 clients on the Shore annually, Sedjat said.

"Many agencies, both public and private, are having a really hard time with retention of employees as well as recruitment of employees," she said.

"To retain the staff we have now as well as recruit new staff ... we had to get creative."

The need for better work-life balance was a "recurring theme" in exit interviews with several staff, she said — a concern the CSB's Rebecca Creed echoed.

The 32-hour workweek "really promotes a worklife balance, which is so important for people in the mental health and medical field," said the senior clinician at the CSB's Nassawadox office.

"I don't have kids at home anymore, but the struggle of that work-home balance is so challenging for so many people," Creed said. "It makes it very difficult to be refreshed and ready to work with clients in the best possible way if you're not able to take care of yourself the way that you need to."

Sedjat said she hopes the new policy will help that.

"If you are rejuvenated and relaxed and ready to go back to work, you're going to provide a higher level of care," she said. "We expect client care to improve."

### Pilot project

The CSB reports the number of clients each employee sees and this metric will help measure staff productivity during the shorter workweek, Sedjat said.

Its board of directors receives updates about the policy during its monthly meetings, including how many staff the CSB recruits, how many employees report staying at the CSB as a result of the policy, and any feedback clients give about the program, she said.

After the 180-day trial, the board will decide whether to continue the policy, with the potential to extend it another 180 days, she said.

The CSB's pilot program is in its early stages, but Sedjat noted challenges come with its expected benefits.

"It was hard (for employees) to conceptualize that they're going to work 32 hours and get paid for 40," she said.

Other challenges include aligning schedules so the CSB's services remain equally available.

Benefits include more hours to pick children up after school, attend medical appointments, and take care of other personal matters that contribute to employees' work-life balance, Sedjat said.

"It's a very stressful job," she said of the CSB's work, which includes outpatient mental health, substance use counseling, peer recovery support, pre-

vention, developmental disability services, and other services across 10 locations on the Eastern Shore. Around 140 people work at the CSB, Sedjat said.

"That has just given people a great sense of relief," she said.

### Catching on

The CSB is among other groups worldwide testing a shorter standard workweek.

Thirty-three companies employing about 1,000 people in the U.S., Ireland, and Australia last year tested a four-day, 32-hour workweek over a sixmonth pilot designed by the nonprofit 4 Day Week Global and professors at Boston College.

The trial asked employees to work 80% of their regular hours in return for 100% of their pay and a pledge to deliver 100% of their usual output — the same as the CSB's 32-hour workweek policy.

Of the 27 companies that reported back, 25 said they planned to continue the schedule, according to a December 2022 article by The Hill.

U.S. Rep. Mark Takano, of California, reintroduced his "Thirty-Two Hour Workweek Act" to Congress in March. If passed, the act would amend the federal Fair Labor Standards Act to shorten the standard workweek from 40 hours to 32 hours.

In Maryland, a bill working its way through the state legislature would incentivize companies to switch to a four-day workweek by offering public and private employers a state tax credit when they participate in a pilot program.

"I really hope that we're trendsetters," Creed said of the CSB's policy.

"If you can respond, you're responsible, and I felt like I could do something to respond to the happiness factor at the agency that I direct," Sedjat said.

"If I can be the cause of people being happy at work, then I want to do that," she said.

# County eyed for teen resettlement facility

A Texas company is interested in using the former Quail Run Assisted Living facility in Gargatha to provide temporary housing for unaccompanied minors under U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and the Office of Refugee Resettlement care.

The center could provide over 200 job opportunities, according to a two-page document Responsive Deployment LLC sent to Accomack County.

However, this type of property use is not allowed in any zoning districts in Accomack County and the Board of Supervisors is not considering changing the zoning ordinance, County Administrator Mike Mason said in a statement Tuesday.

A Responsive Deployment representative contacted the county by email

### **Would bring 200 jobs**

A company that wants to convert the former Quail Run Assisted Living facility in Gargatha into a teen resettlement complex for teenagers said the endeavor would bring 200 jobs to Accomack County.

May 12 to express interest in beginning the process to amend the county's zoning ordinance to allow a children's residential facility as a conditional use in the Agricultural District, where Quail Run falls, Mason said.

"According to my conversations with Chairman (Robert) Crockett, the company's request will not be taken up by the board now or in the future," he said.

To change the ordinance, the board of supervisors would first need to

adopt a resolution initiating the amendment that would allow such a facility as a conditional use, and then refer the matter to the county's planning commission for a recommendation, Mason said.

"For something like that to happen, there's an extensive process that includes multiple public meetings," he said.

"It literally takes months for that to happen," Mason added.

"There has been no such action by the board of supervisors."

Responsive Development is a company serving government and commercial clients and has served as contractor in military installations in the United States and abroad.

According to the document it sent Accomack County, the company proposed using the former Quail Run property to provide temporary care for unaccompanied teens, age 13 to 17, from Central and South America, with a focus on unifying children with family or sponsors.

Other goals in the document included assisting youth in integrating back into the community; providing a vocational or educational environment; creating a plan for each child that includes case management, behavior health, and medical care; and providing training opportunities for staff.

Responsive Deployment CEO Rick Geisel did not immediately respond to a request for comment.

Quail Run Assisted Living closed in 2018. The former 60-bed nursing home and 42-bed assisted living facility has been unoccupied since, to the best of Mason's knowledge.

The property is at 17425 Lankford Highway, Nelsonia.

# Virginia Organizing's Eastern Shore chapter gets new leader

The Northampton school board was "trying to get it right for our graduating seniors," Chair Liz Jones told the Eastern Shore Post on May 12.

The problem started when school board members realized that Saturday, June 3, the 2023 graduation date that they had approved around

a year ago, was the same date set for Virginia High School League track and field state finals.

Some graduating seniors would have had to "make a choice between two extremely momentous occasions in their life," said Superintendent Lisa Martin.

At the April 27 school board meeting, she proposed changing the graduation date to Thursday, June 8.

Jones said she would entertain a motion "to accept the ... proposal to move the 2023 graduation from June 3 to June 8." The motion was made, seconded, and passed in a 4-1 roll-call vote.

The chair cast the opposing vote

because she did not want to interfere with the plans of more than 100 graduating seniors and their families.

It was a "terrible situation and a really difficult decision," Jones said, although she supported the outcome of the vote.

But the June 8 graduation date was never announced to students and parents.

The day after the vote, Martin met with Northampton's high school leadership team, which includes the high school principal, assistant principal, and athletics director.

They learned that June 8 was a "travel day" for the upcoming VHSL finals and the school board asked them to change the 2023 graduation date to Sunday, June 4, Jones said.

Martin did not have the school board reconvene and take another roll-call vote to move the graduation date a second time, but she emailed the school board members to notify them of the change.

Jones said she loves Northampton schools, wants to make decisions in the best interests of the students, and is committed to following proper procedures in school board meetings.

The Northampton school board also voted on April 27 to move the 2024 graduation to an alternate date, to be determined, that will not conflict with VHSL's schedule.

Regarding the last-minute changes to this year's graduation date, Jones said, "We are absolutely making sure ... that never happens again."

# Miyares addresses Christian businessmen

Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares told 140 attendees at the annual Eastern Shore Christian Prayer Breakfast on Monday at the Exmore Moose Lodge that he first resisted the urgings of others to run for office in November 2021, saying he loved his time with his wife and three daughters, liked being a member of a small law firm, and enjoyed being near the water in his Virginia Beach home.

But when praying on the matter, he eventually felt called to serve.

By winning the election, Miyares became the first Hispanic American to be elected to a statewide office in Virginia, the first child of an immigrant to be attorney general, and the first attorney general candidate in Virginia to defeat an incumbent since 1885.

Miyares said he remains grounded by knowing his foundation is based on "family, faith, and friends."

Miyares doesn't call his story "the American dream." He calls it "the American miracle," describing how his mother left Cuba penniless and homeless to start a new life in the United States and then worked to provide him opportunities for a better life.

"She taught me the greatest quality you can have is gratitude, and the ugliest trait in a person is ingratitude," said Miyares.

He noted that a simple knock on the door shows the uniqueness of our country.

"In this country, it might be your neighbor paying a friendly visit. In many countries, it might mean being taken away because of something you said or something you believe," said Miyares, rapping on the lectern to drive the point home.

Miyares pointed out that a vast majority of the world's population doesn't have freedom of speech, freedom of religion, or freedom of the press. "Millions of people would love to be seated where you are seated today," Miyares said,

A product of Virginia public schools, Miyares graduated with a bachelor's degree in business administration from James Madison University and received his law degree from The College of William and Mary School of Law. He previously served as a prosecutor in the Virginia Beach Commonwealth's Attorney Office

The Rev. Bill McClung Jr. provided the invocation and scripture reading, while Holly Westergren sang two religious songs.

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# Fishermen file menhaden lawsuit vs. VMRC

A group of commercial and recreational fishermen is suing the Virginia Marine Resources Commission for not protecting the Chesapeake Bay's population of menhaden — the herring-like fish that is a food source for sport fish such as striped bass — from further depletion.

The lawsuit filed May 10 alleges that on April 13, VMRC adopted a regulation that, instead of reducing the amount of menhaden caught in Virginia, could actually increase the annual catch by 21,000 metric tons.

The plaintiff is the Southern Maryland Recreational Fishing Organization, a 501(c)(4) nonprofit whose members fish in Maryland and Virginia in and near the Chesapeake Bay.

Phil Zalesak, the organization's president, stated that over the last decade, the group has noticed a decline in populations of menhaden and the fish including striped bass that feed on menhaden.

The menhaden not only are food for larger fish and birds like ospreys, they are filter feeders that help clean the Chesapeake Bay.

They prefer to eat algae, which can overgrow, forming blooms that block sunlight from marine plants. The death and decay of these algal blooms also deprive marine life of oxygen.

According to the lawsuit, the menhaden population decline caused "damage to Virginia waters" that influenced a decline in organization membership, revenue, and the number of programs the organization can support.

Nearly 1 million recreational fishermen in Virginia contribute \$1.3 billion in economic output and support almost 10,000 jobs, Zalesak testified.

### Managing fishery

VMRC has been tasked with managing the state's Atlantic menhaden fishery, preventing overfishing, and practicing conservation based on the "best scientific, economic, biological and sociological information available," the lawsuit continued.

Every year, the Atlantic Interstate Commission sets the total allowable catch for menhaden for all participating states on the East Coast.

Virginia is allowed to catch about 175,000 metric tons of menhaden per year, or 75% of the total menhaden harvest for the East Coast.

New Jersey has the next highest allowance at just 11% of the total annual menhaden harvest.

Since 2017, the Atlantic Interstate Commission has capped the amount of menhaden that can be caught in the Chesapeake Bay to 51,000 metric tons.

Virginia may set its catch limits lower but cannot exceed those set by the Atlantic Interstate Commission, which increased in 2022.

### 'Rubber-stamped' limit

Omega Protein, a Canadian company, operates the East Coast's last remaining menhaden reduction fishery, which is in the Chesapeake Bay.

The reduction fishery is so named because the menhaden are reduced to make fish meal, oil, and

VMRC granted Omega Protein, called the "Industrial Harvester" in the lawsuit, 90% of Virginia's annual allowable catch of menhaden, about 158,000 metric tons, which is 21,000 metric tons more than it was permitted to catch last year.

The lawsuit notes that since only 51,000 metric tons of menhaden can be taken from the bay, the remaining 107,000 metric tons of menhaden must be caught elsewhere in Virginia waters.

However, Omega Protein harvests the rest of the menhaden in and near the mouth of the Chesapeake Bay, further depleting the menhaden in the bay and preventing other menhaden from entering the bay and replenishing the menhaden population, the plaintiff contends.

The lawsuit argues that VMRC acted unlawfully when it "rubber-stamped" the Atlantic Interstate Commission's new menhaden catch limit without considering available scientific data or applying conservation and management practices as required by Virginia statute.

The lawsuit also argues that VMRC acted unlawfully by adopting the regulation in April; the prescribed period to adopt menhaden management regulations is from Oct. 1 to Dec. 31.

The plaintiff is asking the court for relief including: striking the adopted regulation, requiring VMRC to rewrite the regulation in a manner that protects Virginia waters and the Chesapeake Bay, setting a timeline for VMRC to complete its analysis and enact the new regulation, and awarding the petitioner's costs and attornevs' fees.

In accordance with the requirements set forth in Section 58.1-3524(C)(2) and Section 58.1-3912(E) of the Code of Virginia, as amended by Chapter 1 of the Acts of Assembly (2004 Special Session 1) and as set forth in item 503.E (Personal Property Tax Relief Program) of Chapter 951 of the 2005 Acts of Assembly any qualifying vehicle site used within the County commencing January 1, 2023 shall receive personal property tax relief in the following manner:

- a. Personal use vehicles valued at \$1,000 or less will be eligible for 100% tax relief;
- b. Personal use vehicles valued at \$1,001 to \$20,000 will be eligible for 41.0% tax relief;
- c. Personal use vehicles valued at \$20,001 or more shall only receive 41.0% tax relief on the first \$20,000 of value; and
- d. All other vehicles which do not meet the definition of "qualifying" (business use vehicles, farm use vehicles, motor homes, etc.) will not be eligible for any form of tax relief under this program.

In accordance with Item 503.D.1., the entitlement to personal property tax relief for qualifying vehicles for tax year 2005 and all prior years expired on September 1, 2006. Supplemental assessments for tax years 2005 and prior that are made on or after September 1, 2006 shall be deemed "non-qualifying" for purposes of state tax relief and the local share due from the taxpayer shall represent 100% of the tax assessable.

# Striped bass and black sea bass seasons open this week

Striped bass (rockfish) season opened up on Tuesday, May 16, on both the Chesapeake Bay and seaside. The recreational black sea bass season opened on Monday, May 15. More details are below.

The Virginia Chesapeake (Bay) Area Season (Spring) for striped bass (rockfish) opened up on Tuesday, May 16, and will run through June 15, 2023. During this period, anglers are



Bill Hall allowed one (1) fish per person and that fish must measure between 20 and 28 inches in length.

The Virginia Coastal (seaside) striped bass season also opened up on Tuesday, May 16, and is scheduled to run through Decem-

ber 31, 2023. During this period, anglers fishing seaside waters out to the 3-mile limit are allowed to possess one (1) fish and that fish must measure between 28 and 36 inches in length.

The recreational black sea bass season reopened on Monday, May 15, and remains open until July 6, 2023. Anglers are allowed up to 15 fish per person and the fish must measure at least 13 inches in total length.

### Upper Shore

The Sea Hawk Sports Center described the recent action in the Chesapeake Bay shallows as "world class." Anglers soaking peeler and soft crabbaits in the grass flats of Tangier and Pocomoke Sounds are encountering red drum, speckled trout, and rockfish. Rockfish and striped bass catches have also come on artificial baits such as Mirrolures and paddletail soft plas-

tics fished on ¼-ounce jigheads. Salt & Pepper and Albino have both been productive color patterns.

On the seaside, anglers reported an influx of smaller flounder last week, though some keeper-sized fish were still landed. Best fishing has been occurring along the edge of the flats, in 2 to 6-foot depths during the last portion of a flood tide through the ebb.

Clear water is a must for successful flounder action. Top and bottom rigs with Gulp Baits tipped with silversides or live minnows have been the most often used bait offering. Red drum, black drum, and rockfish have all been caught and released in the barrier island surf.

### Chincoteague

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, told me that the recent windy weather has made flounder fishing tough, but some of the best flounder action has shifted into water depths of 8 to 15 feet during the last week.

Some larger "toothy" sharks have started to appear north of the Queen Sound Bridge. Kingfish (whiting) are beginning to show up in good numbers. The surf fishing on Assateague Island has produced a variety of species over the last week, including some large striped bass and red drum. Some black drum remain, but the best of that spring fishery is probably over; however, whiting catches are steadily improving. Joining the mix in the surf over the last week have been some of the more unwelcome summer species, such as sharks, skates, and some large rays.

### Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul described the current flounder bite out of Wacha-



preague as "pretty decent." Most of the successful flounder fishermen have been using the Berkley Gulp/live minnow bait combination on two-hook rigs. He added that a few black drum are still being caught in the inlet, with scattered red drum and rockfish catches coming from the barrier island surf.

### Lower Shore

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle said that the black drum fishing last weekend was the "best of the season." Anglers fishing both the seaside waters out of Oyster and the lower bayside were often rewarded with multiple catches while using clam and crab baits. Some boats

reported double digit catches of black drum, according to Brady. The Cape Charles Fire Company's Black Drum Tournament concludes Sunday, May 21. A 59-pound, 4-ounce fish was leading the tournament early in the week

The sheepshead bite around the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay was described as slower than the previous week. Red drum catch and releases were reported from the surf along Fisherman Island by anglers soaking peeler crab baits. Flounder catches slowed a little this week inside the Ditch as well as along the Fisherman Inlet Bridge. Sand mullet (whiting) catches are coming from the Cabbage Patch and along the concrete ships off Kiptopeke.

There he earned high enough marks to qualify for the National Christian College Athletic Association's national track meet at Columbia International University in Columbia, S.C., that took place from May 10 to 12.

At nationals, Cropper earned

All-American honors in all three events in which he participated. He placed third in the high Jump, fifth in the triple jump, and sixth in the long jump.

Cropper's coach, Meghan Chaffins, is also a local product. A native of Temperanceville and a 2017 graduate of Holly Grove Christian School, Chaffins earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in communications and a Bachelor of Arts degree in sports and exercise science from Randolph College in 2021. She also earned a Master of Arts

degree in coaching and sports leadership in 2022, and she was a member of the Randolph volleyball and indoor/outdoor track teams.



# Public hearing set on boat ramp parking permit rules

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing June 21 to receive feedback on proposed changes to rules overseeing parking permits required on vehicles and trailers parked at public boat ramps.

The changes the board is considering would allow the county to issue up to six annual parking permits to a charter boat captain that would be transferable among customers and reduce fees from \$40 to \$30 per permit if the captain has a saltwater fishing license.

The permits originated to address limited parking at public landings, but could be costing county taxpayers, Supervisor Ron Wolff said.

"Everybody in the county's paying this whether they're a fisherman or not, whether they're a boat owner or not," Wolff said.

He and Supervisor C. Reneta Major asked if Accomack County staff can examine the cost of the program and any revenue it generates from parking violations.

"It was all done in good intention, but there's nothing wrong with asking for information to see if this is working and I think we can do that next month during the public hearing," Board of Supervisors Chair Robert

Crockett said.

One member of the public commented on the decal requirements.

"We've got to find a better solution, and especially for our people that are captains ... They bring a lot of money into our county," said Grayson Chesser of Saxis.

# Wetlands mitigation

The board adopted new language providing a conditional use permitting process to approve wetlands mitigation sites and allowing for off-site mitigation "in an area that is neither located on the same parcel of land as the impact site, nor on a parcel (of) land contiguous to the parcel containing the impact site."

Several members of the public urged the board to elect that option, citing the need for flexibility in identifying wetlands mitigation sites for local projects, during Wednesday's public hearing.

"We have projects that cannot move forward in Accomack County ... until mitigation is available," said Chris Mc-Cabe, a Maryland-based environmental consultant working in Accomack and other areas.

The changes to the county's code are "focused on the conditional use permit process," Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason said, meaning the board of supervisors would approve or deny wetlands mitigations banks on a case-by-case basis.

Wetlands mitigation is used by developers to compensate for wetlands unavoidably destroyed during a construction project. Wetlands are protected under the federal Clean Water Act, the Virginia State Water Control Law, and local wetlands ordinances to

achieve no net loss of wetlands as projects are planned and constructed.

# Opioid grant

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors authorized the county administrator to apply for a \$32,416 grant from the Virginia Opioid Abatement Authority to combat the impacts of the opioid epidemic on the Eastern Shore.

County staff applied for the grant prior to its May 5 deadline, but needed a formal resolution from the board to accept the funds, if awarded.

"This money's already committed to the existing County/ESCSB pilot project for opioid abuse abatement that is primarily focused on Tangier, but available to all the county residents as well," Mason said.

# Meetings planned to determine pavilion particulars

The Onancock Town Council met Monday to discuss plans that will govern a future performance pavilion at Historic Onancock School on College Avenue.

The council will host several special meetings to hash out details from what time performances should end to parking, security, alcohol sales, noise levels, and other guidelines, as well as how to enforce rules for the pavilion.

Though the town council did not vote or hear public comment at Monday's meeting, around 20 attended the special session.

"I think tonight was a first step in compromise," said Councilmember Joy Marino. "As I've always heard, a good compromise is when both parties are dissatisfied, and so we need to consider both FOS (Friends of Onancock School) and the concerned citizens."

The performance pavilion is a project by Friends of Onancock School, which operates the nonprofit Historic Onancock School.

Groundbreaking on the pavilion took place in November after FOS obtained the necessary permits and received a vote of support from the town council, but was followed by controversy when neighbors expressed concerns about issues from traffic and crowd control to noise, bathroom facilities, alcohol sales, trash removal, and potential vandalism of the venue.

FOS has paused pavilion construction while the community reaches consensus on how performances can coexist with neighbors' way of life.

The town council discussed Monday how to enforce pavilion performance guidelines. The town attorney's "strong suggestion is that we use a special use permit process," said Town Manager Matt Spuck.

A special use permit process would allow FOS to submit an application for the special permit from the town, triggering a series of official procedures involving at least two public hearings by Onancock's planning commission and town council, Spuck said.

"That's where the community is going to voice their concerns to council," he said.

Mayor Fletcher Fosque noted a special use permit would have a limited lifespan and the town would review it after a period of time, providing an opportunity to update the permit's terms.

In its series of special sessions, the

town council aims to clarify those terms.

One topic the town council tackled Monday was when to allow performances at the pavilion.

"May through October sounds very reasonable to me," said Councilmember Maphis Oswald, noting the limits would only apply to amplified music, which FOS defined as a "musical performance by a group utilizing amplified instruments and/or amplified vocals" in its three-page Pavilion Operational Guidelines document.

The document also addresses concerns about sound, parking, security, and community engagement for the pavilion.

Non-amplified events at the pavilion would not face the same restrictions.

FOS's plan proposes a 10 p.m. cutoff for music at the pavilion, but councilmembers were divided on the suggestion.

"You have to look at our town. There are a lot of people that are retired in town," Marino said. "Some people in town are in bed at 8 o'clock ... so I think 10 o'clock is stretching it quite a lot."

Others noted live music at downtown restaurants, Shore History events at Kerr Place, and weddings in town already run until 10 p.m. with amplified sound.

"Now that we've started considering all of these different events that could have amplified music, two events per month sounds very low," said Councilmemeber Ray Burger of another proposed limit on the number of amplified events allowed at the pavilion.

One solution could be restricting limits to only larger, ticketed events, or adopting "quiet weekends" at the stage, councilmembers said.

The town council said plans are in the works to create an advisory group to help reach consensus on issues related to the pavilion, though the makeup of that group will be determined in the future.

FOS's Pavilion Operational Guidelines document says the group plans to establish such a group, including "representatives of all Onancock neighborhoods, with varied age and ethnic demographics ... (and) local businesses and performance stakeholders."

"I think we've come a long way ... tonight, and I hope that trend will continue," said Councilmember Sarah Nock at the close of Monday's meeting.

The town council has not set a date for its next special meeting to discuss the pavilion, Spuck said Wednesday.
