Construction projects resume; **Bay Creek, town** reach agreement

Cape Charles and the developer of the Bay Creek residential and golf community have settled a longstanding legal dispute involving water and wastewater services that stalled construction projects, the town's municipal manager said.

The settlement means construction projects are no longer impeded.

Town Manager John Hozey said on Tuesday, July 25, that the town is back to "business as usual" after the issue was resolved.

The dispute began more than 30 years ago when the approximately three-squaremile area now known as Bay Creek was annexed into the incorporated town limits of Cape Charles.

According to the annexation agreement, Cape Charles would extend its town water and sewer service to the area now known as

Crudup honored with historical marker

Among the seven new historical markers coming to roadsides in Virginia are signs that will highlight three distinct communities founded by formerly enslaved African Americans after the Civil War; the City of Richmond's first municipal African burial ground; and the life and work of Arthur Crudup, a 20th-century blues musician of the Eastern Shore whose song "That's All Right" launched the career of Elvis Presley.

The marker will be near Nassawadox.

Crudup, a blues singer, guitarist, and songwriter, supported his family as a laborer and farm worker and moved to Franktown around 1960.

He toured internationally and performed with his sons James, George, and Jonas as The Malibus in Weirwood and Nassawadox. He died March 28, 1974, and his gravesite is near Franktown.





Phillips sets re-election bid for District 5 supervisor seat

Accomack County District 5 Supervisor Harrison Phillips III has announced his candidacy for re-election to the Accomack Board of Supervisors in the Nov. 7 election.

"Serving my friends and neighbors of District 5 over the past eight years has been a great honor, but there's more to be done," said Phillips.

Phillips called himself a big supporter of the Mary Nottingham Smith Cultural Enrichment Center.

"After seeing many former schools in our county having fallen into disrepair, it's great to see the amazing work the Alumni Association has done with that building," he said.

Previously, as a member of the Mary N. Smith project management team, and in his current roles as a supervisor and as chairman of the Acco-

mack-Northampton Planning District Commission, Phillips has been working to help obtain funding to continue renovations and maintain the property.

Phillips said he has "has kept true to his campaign promise to fight

against tax increases and to fight for the citizens."

"I proposed the tax rate decrease we approved last year and will continue to do everything possible to keep our taxes low," he said.

When Riverside Health Services announced it was closing Shore LifeCare

in Parksley, Phillips said he and other supervisors were able to facilitate a sale to Saber Healthcare, which renovated the property at an estimated cost of \$3 million.

"We saved over 100 jobs and kept a long-term care facility for our seniors here in Accomack," he said.

Phillips said he believes public safety is the most important service that local government provides. He said he has worked to retain firemedics, who provide a critical service to our citizens, with salary increases and enhanced benefits. Over the last year he has also fought to offer tax relief to all active fire and rescue volunteers.

"We need to do everthing we can to incentivize these hardworking men and women, because without them the cost to the taxpayer would be outrageous," he said.

Phillips is a third-generation businessman at Jaxon's in Parksley. He recently was selected, along with his father and aunt, as small businesspersons of the year by the Eastern Shore Chamber of Commerce for their years of service and dedication to the community.

Phillips, born and raised on the Eastern Shore, grew up in Parksley and now resides in Modest Town. He graduated from Arcadia High School in 2000 and holds a computer electronics degree from ECPI University in Virginia Beach.

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
Effective August 1, 2023, Tidewater Fibre Corporation, the County's recycling vendor, will cease servicing the Eastern Shore.



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State trooper assaulted after being hit by alleged DUI driver

A state trooper's vehicle was struck north of Belle Haven by a driver allegedly under the influence of alcohol while the officer was traveling to Riverside Shore Memorial Hospital to investigate a separate DUI accident.

Afterward, the family of the driver in the Belle Haven crash arrived at the scene and a woman allegedly attacked the trooper who was hit by the DUI

The incident happened at 2:20 a.m. on Saturday, July 22, on U.S. Route 13 south of Coal Kiln Road, according to a state police spokeswoman.

Traquan Briscoe, 24, of Exmore, was arrested after police said he crossed from the southbound lane to the northbound lane of U.S. Route 13, striking the trooper's vehicle.

State police did not identify the trooper, who was following an ambulance headed for the hospital and transporting a suspect in an earlier DUI

The trooper sustained minor injuries in the crash, a police spokeswoman said.

Briscoe allegedly attempted to leave the scene but was taken into custody. He is charged with driving under the influence of alcohol and failure to maintain a driving lane.

He was jailed with no bond.

State police said "several friends and family members" of Briscoe arrived at the scene and "a female became loud and belligerent and assaulted the trooper."


She was identified as 23-year-old Mattie Black, of Cape Charles. She is charged with a felony count of assault of a law enforcement officer and a misdemeanor count of disorderly conduct.

She also was jailed without bond.

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A high school reunion without Sean Spady, who loved them

Cape Charles native Sean Spady had a smile bright enough to cut through darkness and arms long enough to hug everyone at once.

He loved class reunions, and last weekend the Northampton High School class of 1991 gathered for a reunion for the first time without him.

Sean was there for the 10th and 20th reunions. He would practically beg our class officers to plan more.

Just reserve a space, send me the bill, and invite everyone, he told them.

But Sean, a long-haul truck driver who lived in Georgia, died a horrible, confusing death in early 2021.

He stopped at a truck stop in California for a pizza. Weeks later, a fellow truck driver noticed Sean's truck had not moved.

Sean's body was in the driver's seat, holding the unopened pizza.

Authorities said he died of an abnormally thick heart muscle that made it harder for his heart to pump blood.

What shook us all was that Sean was alone in the world — there was no spouse, no children, no siblings, and nobody else to check up on him.

His few family members are distant relatives in Bal-

timore with whom he had no contact. They weren't able or willing to help in the aftermath of Sean's death.

"We were his family," said Alicia Johnson Richardson, one of our class officers, referring to his classmates.

When police found Sean's body, the only link to someone who knew Sean was the bulletin from his mother's funeral service, which he kept in his truck.

It referenced Gray's Funeral Home in Cape Charles. The police made contact, starting the process of bringing him home.

Nobody in our class knew that Sean had died. On March 20, 2021, we all wished him a happy birthday on our graduating class Facebook page — but at that time, his body already had been in a Riverside County. Calif., morgue for six weeks, waiting for someone to claim it.

Our thoughtful class officers organized a fundraiser to get Sean home. The money raised covered the cremation, urn, shipping postage, death certificate,

Thomas Godwin of Gray's Funeral Home told me Sean is home now. His urn is interred in the Cape Charles Cemetery.

Nobody knows what became of his home in Georgia or his belongings.

The tragedy of Sean's death became a telling story of an Eastern Shore graduating class's love and respect for one of its own.

Sean's enthusiasm also reframes the meaning of class reunions and their tired byproducts, like ubiquitous boozy selfie photos such gatherings always produce.

When a graduating class is full of good people, like Sean, Alicia, and so many others, a reunion is more than an event. It's the continuation of a relationship.

I'm fond of my high school classmates and grateful for the opportunity to see so many of them last

We missed seeing Sean, our friend who loved reunions so much.

"He would have been the first person to sign up," Richardson said.

Who will put a stop to the practice of overfishing menhaden?

The July 21 edition of the Eastern Shore Post brought horrifying and tragic news on the environmental front for Virginia.

I read first on page 11 the guest column by Patty McLaughlin regarding the short-sighted and dangerous dealings of our state government and agencies not taking a firmer stance on the overfishing of menhaden by Omega Protein.

I then continued reading the paper and on page 23 there was a story entitled, "Osprey nest failures riddle lower Chesapeake."

I had heard just days before on national news about Osprey offspring dying in alarming numbers "driven by the overharvesting of Atlantic menhaden."

This is very serious news that needs to be on the front page considering the ongoing challenge of the sportfishing industry (and the tourism dollars it generates to Chesapeake Bay communities) to the Omega Protein Company, the "overharvester" of this menhaden.

It is another high alert regarding the same problem of this company being allowed to overfish the menhaden

in the lower bay.

Our Virginia Marine Resources Commissioners, appointed by Gov. Glenn Youngkin, continue to permit the practice of decimating this natural food source so needed not just for the recreational fish species but marine mammals and other wildlife like ospreys — whose lives rely on this food source.

A simple solution would be to separate the menhaden populations into bay and ocean catches.

They need to be managed separately to protect the species which feed on them to survive.

As noted in McLaughlin's column,

the states of New Jersey, Maryland, and New York all banned this factory fishing from their shallow waters and an overall robust aquatic bay life is again thriving.

It is not rocket science. It is informed management that is acted on by smart managers.

It appears the managers we rely on in Virginia are not only not smart, but not representing the better interests of the residents of the state or the natural resources they are also pledged to protect.

Who will step up to stop this practice?

Cygnus launch scheduled for Aug. 1

NASA and Northrop Grumman are targeting liftoff of the company's Antares rocket and Cygnus spacecraft, named the S.S. Laurel Clark, no earlier than 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 1, from the Mid-Atlantic Regional Spaceport's Pad 0A at the agency's Wallops Flight Facility.

The mission will deliver NASA science investigations, supplies, and equipment to the International Space Station.

Following launch, Cygnus will be grappled by the space station's Canadarm2 no earlier than Friday, Aug. 4, and berthed to the Unity module's Earth-facing port for cargo unloading by the Expedition 69 crew.

Cargo resupply from U.S. companies ensures a national capability to deliver critical scientific research to the space station, significantly increasing NASA's ability to conduct new investigations aboard humanity's laboratory in space.

Is Custis site a wetlands yet? Official says give it some time

The Nature Conservancy has responded to citizens who are concerned that a wetlands restoration project near Exmore has been unsuccessful.

"We need some time for the site to grow and mature ... you just can't rush that," said Jill Bieri, director of TNC's Volgenau Virginia Coast Reserve, on Tuesday, July 25.

The site, which is visible from U.S. Route 13, just south of Exmore, has been a point of contention for some Northampton County residents since heavy equipment operators began moving the soil months ago.

The 26-acre parcel was named the Custis site, in reference to its previous owner, farmer Phil Custis.

The former farm field was recently converted back into a wetlands to off-

set development in the Atlantic Ocean Basin, which includes parts of Virginia Beach in addition to Accomack and Northampton counties.

Earlier this year, native species were planted throughout the site, including on its berm — a long, narrow mound that separates the wetlands mitigation site from the surrounding area.

Native grasses and infant trees are growing all over the Custis site, but the seeds that were planted on the berm are struggling to sprout.

Bieri said heavy rains likely washed away the first seeds that were spread on the berm, and it was reseeded sometime in late May or early June.

The site may appear dry, but that is common for nontidal wetlands in the summer. This type of wetlands is more likely to be inundated during the winter, Bieri noted.

It's also common for wetlands miti-

gation sites to require some replanting of native species, as well as removal of invasive species, she said.

"We're going to make sure it's successful," Bieri said.

A private company, Resource Environmental Solutions, engineered the Custis site using techniques that were developed over the last 16 years, since RES was founded in 2007.

RES began its work in Louisiana and has completed projects in Texas, Virginia, West Virginia, Ohio, and Pennsylvania.

RES is now the largest ecological restoration company in the U.S.

According to the company's website, RES "delivers uniquely successful outcomes because we internalize the real risk of the projects we build and guarantee them for the long term."

Hali Plourde-Rogers, executive director of the Virginia Eastern Shore Land Trust, has spoken with the conservancy about the future possibility of protecting the Custis site through a conservation easement.

"VES Land Trust supports wetland creation and protection," she said in a written statement on July 26.

At present, VES Land Trust "has not approved an easement on the property and will evaluate it for an easement when it's established as a wetland. All properties considered for conservation easements must meet a set of criteria or exhibit extraordinary conservation benefit to be considered and approved by the board," Plourde-Rogers said.

"Wetlands provide habitat, filter water, and reduce flooding," she said. "VES Land Trust holds conservation easements on 3,045 acres of wetlands, 4,437 acres of working farmland, and 5,857 acres of forest."

In a narrow vote, town OK's office space for Main Street initiative at 38 Market St.

Onancock will provide space in its planned visitor center to its Main Street group for an office and conference room.

The agreement follows a narrow vote of support by the town council on Monday, July 24, when Councilmember Cindy Holdren, also a boardmember of Onancock Main Street, asked the town to provide the space for OMS to relocate its office.

Mayor Fletcher Fosque supported the request in a tie-breaking vote, noting his relationship to OMS President Janet Fosque and the benefits Main Street provides downtown Onancock. The Fosques are married.

"We're going to have a million dollars coming in to this town because of them. They apply for grants," said Fletcher Fosque, referencing an Industrial Revitalization Fund award the town recently received after partnering with OMS to apply for the funds.

"If the town can make this space available, that will enable Main Street to do more for the town. Then we're all in better shape," said Councilmember Sarah Nock.

Other councilmembers said the decision was rushed.

"We all support Main Street ... We just need to be very thoughtful about these decisions that we make because they have long-term impact," said Councilmember Joy Marino, adding Onancock should develop a policy for providing space to non-profit organizations before making a decision.

Onancock purchased the building at 38 Market St. last year with plans to install new public restrooms and a welcome center there.

It used reserve funds to buy the

property for \$175,000, so there was no debt associated with the purchase, said Town Manager Matt Spuck.

Onancock set aside \$340,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funds to restore the space, but plans and costs to renovate the building are still in the works, he said.

Those plans should be complete in about three weeks and then will go to Accomack County for approval, Spuck

Vice Mayor Maphis Oswald said Onancock should not "commit to anything else until we do what we've said we're going to do" with the building.

Nock noted the space OMS requested is not designated for another purpose.

The building has three main areas, she said, including a front space for the visitor center, side space for restrooms, and a rear corner.

"What Main Street is talking about is the back corner, which ... did not have any intended purpose and this seems like a good fit to me," she said.

Onancock was named a Virginia Main Street community in 2020, opening the town to receive specific grants and services from the Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development, which oversees the Main Street program.

Those include market analysis, marketplace development, capacity building, design assistance, organization development, economic strategies, and façade renderings for redevelopment projects.

OMS has secured several of these since receiving Main Street designaton, and has applied for grants that are funding downtown mural projects and the \$1 million IRF award to renovate

the Lilliston building.

Grants awarded to OMS specifically designated for the betterment of downtown Onancock total almost \$220,000, said OMS Program Manager Jenny Gehman.

The group requested new office space after rent increased from \$225 to \$275 monthly for the OMS office in Historic Onancock School, said Janet Fosque.

"We needed to know that we had commitment of the space so that we could stop looking for any alternative space," she said.

Main Street groups are required

to have an office to qualify for Main Street designation, she said.

Town staff and OMS will work out in the future whether OMS will pay a fee for its office in the visitor center, Spuck said.

Virginia has almost30 designated Virginia Main Street communities, including Onancock and Cape Charles on the Eastern Shore. Since 1985, those communities have generated more than \$1 billion in private investment, according to DHCD.

Flounder fishing remains consistent

Flounder fishing remains some of the most consistent local action



Bill Hall again this with week. jigging over the inshore ocean wrecks producing the largest class of fish. One fish landed earlier in the week tipped the scales at 8 pounds! Flounder fishing inside the in-

lets from Oyster north is producing good numbers of fish during the last segment of the incoming tide, but most anglers are having to cull through lots of undersized fish before putting a limit of keepers in the cooler. The keeper to throwback ratio improves greatly at the southern tip of the Shore.

Upper Shore

Captain Matt Abell, at the Sea Hawk Sports Center, reported that the near-shore reefs out of Chincoteague have been producing a nice class of flounder for anglers jigging. He specifically cited Spro bucktails as being productive on the rail cars on Blackfish Banks.

Captain Abell recommended tipping the jigs with strips of cut bait, squid, or Berkley Gulp to make them more effective. He listed the most productive color combinations as chartreuse, pink, and off-whites. The "new penny" color of Berkley Gulp has been responsible for several fish coming over the gunnels.

Ribbonfish have been a bycatch of the flounder jigging fishery. Matt suggested keeping a couple for filleting and using the fresh filets

as strip baits on the jigs.

There is a population of Atlantic spadefish and gray triggerfish that have taken up residence above the wrecks.

Flounder fishing inside the inlet has produced some keepers for anglers drifting two-hook bottom rigs with Gulp and live minnows or silversides on the last part of the incoming tide. Spot, kingfish (whiting), and red drum ranging from puppies to trophy-sized have been recent catches in the barrier island surf. The surf is also harboring a variety of rays and sharks.

Fishing has slowed on the Chesapeake Bay side as high water temperatures and low oxygen levels have signaled the arrival of the summer doldrums.

Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul, of the charter vessel Almost Persuaded, said the flounder fishing out of Wachapreague is "still very good" during the incoming tide in clear water. He added that many boats are limiting out on the flatfish. Berkley Gulp and live minnows have been productive bait combinations.

The ocean wrecks are still producing black sea bass and flounder. Offshore fishing action was described as slow for trollers, with a few tuna, dolphin (mahi), and marlin encountered. Deep dropping has been productive on both blueline and golden tilefish.

Lower Shore

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, said that the flounder fishing off the southern portion of the peninsula has remained good over the last week, calling it the best he has seen in "quite some time!"

He said that a nice size class of fish have been reported along the "Ditch," around the Fisherman Inlet Bridge, and along the pilings of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel. He said that the offshore flounder bite along the wrecks has been "awesome" as well for anglers using Gulp, squid, and cut bait.

Cobia fishing was described as "decent" with lots of fish sighted but unwilling to take baits. Anglers are blaming this behavior on fish entering the spawning cycle, and the expectation is that the fish will become aggressive again after the spawning process has been completed.

Spadefish populations are reported around the third island of the bridge-tunnel and up at the Cell, while a few sheepshead have been reported around the bridge pilings.

The lower bay pier catches have consisted mostly of small croakers and gray trout.

Dan Bell, at Oceans East-Eastern Shore, described the lower bay cobia bite as "still steady," with some keeper-sized fish being caught on fresh bunker baits while bottom fishing. Sight casting has been productive when the weather cooperates.

Flounder action was described as "still good" at the high-rise section of the bridge-tunnel and in the "Ditch."

Spanish mackerel action has improved for anglers trolling spoons between Kiptopeke and Nassawadox Creek, with some larger fish found among the mackerel schools.

Spadefish catches have come from the Cell and the third island.

For those insomniacs who like to fish, there is a nighttime run of big red drum occurring from sundown to well after midnight at the third island of the bridge-tunnel.

County to seek school bids

Northampton County Public Schools is ready to try again to find an affordable bidder for the construction project on its high and middle school complex.

The move comes about one year after the schools received a low bid nearly \$20 million more than the maximum the county was willing to spend.

Director of Operations Chris Truckner was optomistic that contractors are interested in bidding on the project.

"There's definitely some potential out there. We're hopeful," he said.

At the Northampton School Board's July 13 meeting, officials said they were nearly ready to put the project back out to bid after spending nearly a year regrouping and figuring out how to cut costs.

Last year, the low bid received was \$84 mil-

lion, but county supervisors had wanted to spend no more than \$65 million.

New bids are due Aug. 29 and will be opened the next day. The high school enhancement project committee will meet to review the bids and make a decision.

A joint meeting of the board of supervisors and school board is scheduled for Sept. 5 to announce the winning bid, with a public hearing and bid approval set one week later on Sept. 12.

The contract is expected to be issued to the contractor and returned by Sept. 28. The notice to proceed would be given to the contractor Oct. 9.

The project will be a combination of renovation and new construction at Northampton High School, which also houses the county's middle school.

Construction will take about 30 months, meaning the project would reach substantial completion in spring 2026.

Deborah T. Midgett, Accomack revenue commissioner, to retire

Deborah T. Midgett, the Accomack County Commissioner of the Revenue since her election in 2019, has announced her retirement.

"It has been a previlege to meet and help the people in Accomack County," she said in an email.

"I have also worked with wonderful people during my years in the office and they are always willing to help."

Midgett worked in the office of the comissioner of the revenue for 41 years.

She will officially retire on the last day of her term, which ends Dec. 31.

Noisy equipment can exacerbate hearing loss

Whether you're blowing yard debris from walkways or driving a tractor through a field, noisy equipment can exacerbate hearing loss.

As outdoor duties intensify, homeowners and farmers alike should take precautions to protect their ears when using loud equipment.

Damage to inner-ear hair cells, called cilia, often is caused by exposure to excessively loud sounds, and cannot be medically corrected. This type of hearing loss usually results from repeated exposure to loud sounds over an extended time, like when using a tractor or riding a mower without ear protection.

Most farmers have some degree of hearing loss, said Bedford County farmer and nurse practitioner Amy Johnson, who also serves as president of the Bedford County Farm Bureau. Hearing loss is related to both the intensity of sounds and length of exposure, she said in a safety webinar. Commonly used equipment like grain dryers and chainsaws reach unsafe decibels.

Prolonged loud sound exposure may result in a "stopped-up" feeling or ringing in the ears that eventually fades. But that's a bad sign.

"Once the damage is done to those organs that affect hearing, you really can't undo that," Johnson explained.

Tinnitus, or ringing in the ears, may become constant.

"The effects of living with chronic tinnitus can range from annoying to completely debilitating," wrote Jackie DiFrancesco for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Every year, about 22 million U.S. workers are exposed to potentially damaging noise—one of the most common occupational injuries.

Hearing loss is usually gradual and may go unnoticed for several years, according to AgriSafe, a collective formed by rural nurses to improve the health and safety of farmers. It affects not only older adults, but also young adults and teens.

Key indicators of hearing loss include frequently asking people to repeat things; continually turning up the volume on electronics; tinnitus; difficulty with hearing and understanding conversations in busy areas; and noticing that common environmental noises sound distant or quieter.

"Unfortunately, the tones people lose include women's and children's

voices, so it's hard to hear your grandchildren or wife talking!" Johnson added.

Fortunately, damage is preventable. Hearing protection devices reduce the force of the sound waves reaching the inner ear. The best HPD is one that fits well and is comfortable enough to wear consistently in high-noise environments.

There are three main types of HPD: formable ear plugs made of soft foam that must be rolled down.

New provider takes over county recycling program

Accomack County will continue its recycling program with a new service provider after its longtime provider ceases operations on the Eastern Shore at the end of July.

The switch from Tidewater Fibre Corporation, based in Chesapeake, to Shore Waste of Salisbury, Md., comes at an additional cost to the county of around \$3,200 per month, said Accomack Director of Public Works Stewart Hall in a presentation to the Accomack County Board of Supervisors on Wednesday, July 19.

Supervisors agreed the program is important and unanimously decided to make the switch during that meeting, covering additional costs with county contingency funds.

"Recycling in the county has really become a big deal," said Supervisor Ron Wolff. "If we cut it off now, it would really be devastating not only to patrons, citizens, but our whole process of solid waste."


The move comes after Accomack received notice June 26 that TFC would stop providing hauling and processing for recyclables on the Eastern Shore on July 31, Hall said.

Recycling costs the county \$70 per ton through TFC, which hauls paper, plastic, cardboard, and other recyclables collected at county convenience centers to a facility in Chesapeake to be sorted and sold.

TFC cited rising costs "in all sectors of their business and troubles finding outlets for the materials" as their reason for stopping service on the Shore, Hall said.

Though TFC will no longer collect and haul recyclables from the Eastern Shore's northern landfill in Atlantic, the company said it would still process recycling at a cost of \$150 per ton if Accomack County delivered the materials to the Chesapeake sorting center, he said.

Instead, Shore Waste will pick up the county's recycling from the

same center in Atlantic at a cost of \$130 per ton, Hall said. Eagle Recycling, in Salisbury, will process the materials.

"As far as our patrons at the convenience centers are considered, it would really be invisible to them," he said of the switch in service providers. "We'll still be collecting it in the same way — we'll just be loading it on a different vendor's truck."

Shore Waste will provide the service on a month-to-month basis, allowing county staff more time to seek alternatives that could cut costs.

Though the program is more expensive, supervisors agreed it needs to

continue.

"We'd really be cutting off our nose to spite our face if we didn't do any type of recycling," Wolff said.

Boat ramp rules change

Soon, only vehicles towing a boat trailer will need to display parking permits at Accomack County's public boat ramps.

Accomack requires all vehicles parked at 16 of its public landings to display a permit, but the board of supervisors voted to change those rules after reviewing alternative options.

"The people who are using it ... are

the fishermen," said Wolff of the boat ramps during a public hearing last month, which the board continued last week. "Why are we burdening people who want to go down and sit and watch the sunset or look at birds?"

Existing guidelines aim to address limited parking at the public landings and require a \$7 daily permit or \$40 annual permit for all vehicles parked at public landings.

Those with a Virginia saltwater recreational fishing license pay \$5 for a daily permit or \$30 annually.

Boat owners whose boats are taxed by Accomack County receive a free annual parking permit for each boat taxed by the county. Residents who pay county real estate or personal property taxes can contact the county treasurer's office to receive a permit free of charge.

Starting Jan. 1, 2024, permit requirements will only apply to vehicles towing a boat trailer.

Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason noted the new rule "as written ... would allow vehicles with car-top watercraft carriers like a kayak carrier to park free of charge" at the landings.

EMS boundaries adjusted

Emergency medical services boundaries between the Greenbackville Volunteer Fire Company and Oak Hall Rescue will shift to help first responders answer calls faster.

The Accomack County Board of Supervisors voted June 19 to adjust the boundary between the two companies after geographic information system data showed the boundaries could be fine-tuned to help responders get to medical scenes faster.

The Accomack County Fire and Rescue Commission reviewed the GIS findings in May and recommended making the changes, which aim to meet the 20-minute response-time benchmark the supervisors set by ensuring the closest EMS unit responds to a call.

Bay Creek.

In exchange, Brown & Root Inc., a Texas-based company that owned the property, would pay a portion of the cost to upgrade the water and sewer systems when it exceeded current capacities.

The problem was that the annexation agreement failed to supply a percentage, dollar amount, or means of calculating how much the developer should pay, Hozey said.

In 2022, when Cape Charles decided to sell its water and sewer plants to private company Virginia American Water, town officials were prompted to solve the longstanding legal issue with the two utilities.

The town paid nearly \$50,000 for a study of its water and sewer system capacity, which included projected future demand.

Bay Creek's current developer, Preserve Communities, agreed to fulfill

its obligation by paying Cape Charles a \$3,000 impact fee for every remaining lot sold in Bay Creek.

The fee will be deducted from the seller's proceeds at the close of each property sale.

Hozey said he had paused some Bay Creek construction projects previously because he didn't want to sign off on entire subdivisions without the new legal agreement in place.

Even though the sale of the water and sewer systems prompted Cape Charles officials to act, construction in Bay Creek was put on hold due to concern over the annexation agreement — not the town's water and sewer capacity, he said.

The study of the water and sewer plants suggested that neither facility will reach capacity for years, Hozey said.

The two utilities will be the responsibility of Virginia American Water long before then.

Hozey expects the State Corporation Commission, which regulates Virginia utilities, will approve the sale within the next four to five months.

'There's nothing like it'

Large crowd enjoys tradition of watching Chincoteague Ponies swim channel and parade to carnival grounds

"Good morning, Chincoteague," said Denise Bowden over the loudspeaker to cheers from the crowd in the marsh at 8:14 a.m. Wednesday.

"It's a perfect morning — not too hot, certainly not too cold," said the Pony Penning veteran,

greeting thousands who gathered at Pony Swim Lane to watch Chincoteague's 98th annual Pony Penning.

The Pony Swim began at 10:12 a.m. and lasted roughly four-and-a-half minutes as the wild ponies plunged into the Assateague Channel and swam from Assateague Island to Chincoteague, where Thursday's Pony Auction took place.

About 120 adult ponies and 60 foals swam this year, said Hunter Leonard, spokesperson for the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company, which owns and maintains the herds.

After an hour of rest, the ponies paraded down Main Street,

guided by the Saltwater Cowboys — members of the fire company on horseback — who safeguarded the thousands lining the streets to watch the procession and drove break-away ponies back to their herd.

On Thursday, the fire company auctioned dozens of foals at the Chincoteague carnival grounds during its largest annual fundraiser.

For many, attending the Pony Swim is a rite of passage stemming back to reading Marguerite Henry's novel "Misty of Chincoteague" as a child.

"It was my childhood dream," said Courtney Castro, who traveled from Stanford, Ky., with her husband and two children to watch the swim for the first time.

"It's just one of those things you hear about and you want to live it," said Judy Powers, who came from Annapolis, Md., to watch the swim with friends she made while serving as a U.S. Army nurse.

For others, attending Pony Penning has become an annual tradition.

"We try to get here every year," said Bob Hyson, who brought his children, now in their teens and 20s, from New Jersey to watch the wild ponies cross

the Assateague Channel.

"I came as a child and I just wanted to carry it on with my children," he said.

Pony Penning takes place the last consecutive Wednesday and Thursday of July each year, when visitors flock to Chincoteague to see the island's famous ponies during a beach walk, swim, auction, and other events.

A troop of around 45 members of the Chincoteague Volunteer Fire Company known as Saltwater Cowboys guide the ponies throughout the week. Some, including 90-year-old Jack Brittingham,
