# Momentum grows to limit vacation rentals

Speaker links short-term rentals to escalating housing prices

Wachapreague's approach to regulating short-term vacation rental homes is becoming a template for other Eastern Shore towns that want to minimize the adverse impacts of the commercial enterprises.

Exmore Town Manager Robert Duer said the town's national motel chains are losing revenue due to the proliferation of short-term rental homes in Northampton County, which has allowed these businesses by right — without a permit — since 2019.

"Our motels are suffering," Duer said at the Jan. 8 Exmore Town Council meeting.

Allowing the short-term rentals by

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# Man guilty in 2021 murder of Brian Daley

An Accomack County man pleaded guilty to the murder of Brian Lee Daley, the Onancock cabinetmaker who was slain and robbed after being lured ostensibly into a tryst almost three years ago.

Brandon Jamar Beach, 33, of Onancock, pleaded guilty to second-degree murder, robbery, credit card larceny, maliciously shooting at an occupied vehicle, maliciously shooting at an occupied dwelling, and use of a firearm, as part of an agreement with the Accomack County Commonwealth's Attorney's office.

The terms of the plea agreement were that Beach's first-degree murder charge and reckless handling of a firearm charges were not prosecuted.

Circuit Judge H. Thomas Padrick ordered a presentence report be prepared and set Beach's sentencing for April 4.

Daley was 49 at the time of his March 7, 2021, murder.

At 10 p.m. that day, the Accomack County Sheriff's Office received a report of gunshots fired on Jackson Street in Onancock.

When deputies arrived, they found a white pickup truck that had driven off the road into the front yard of a house.

Inside, they found Daley unresponsive and in a state of undress with multiple stab and gunshot wounds.

When police questioned Daley's wife, she told them he had gone to the nearby home of Antoinette

Satchell and Brandon Beach on 8 Jackson St.

When authorities arrived, they found no one but saw what appeared to be fresh bloodstains on the porch and shell casings, blood, and tissue on a mattress and bedding inside.

Beach and Satchell, his girlfriend, were arrested a short time later.

They were found in a car in the parking lot of a motel in Onley.

Credit cards belonging to Daley were in the car along with a 9mm pistol and a bloody knife.

Beach told police Daley and Satchell were in bed together. He said he had two knives in his hands and began stabbing Daley, who got up and ran downstairs.

He told them he shot at Daley as he ran from the house and drove off in his truck. Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan said statements from Beach and Satchell along with evidence showed "Daley was lured to the Jackson Street house for a physical encounter with Satchell, where they intended to rob him, killing him in the process."

He said the pair put Daley's clothes, cellphone, and wallet into a black trash bag and threw it out on a road near Wachapreague.

Beach took police to that location and the items were recovered.

He said Satchell told him they needed to rob people because she needed money for an upcoming court case involving her three children.

Satchell pleaded guilty to first degree murder and robbery in this case in June 2023 and is set to be sentenced on March 7.

# Attorney Carl Bundick named substitute judge in lower courts

Attorney Carl H. Bundick was sworn in as a substitute judge in General District and Juvenile and Domestic Relations courts in Accomack and Northampton counties.

Bundick has practiced law since graduating from University of Richmond School in May 1991.

He graduated from the College of William and Mary and held several positions before deciding to go to law school. One was as a sports reporter for the Eastern Shore News for six and a half years, he said.

Bundick said he has done legal defense work for almost 33 years and will continue to do so.

"I feel very fortunate that Judge W. Revell Lewis III felt I should serve in that position and am forever grateful I was able to obtain the appointment."

Bundick said he grew up on a farm near Painter and graduated from Central High School.

"I am homegrown," he said.

right, without a special-use permit, was "short-sighted," said Duer, who was the only Northampton supervisor to oppose the legalization of short-term rentals five years ago.

"If you rob your houses of your families, you're robbing your schools," he added. "Nobody's going to live in those houses in the wintertime."

Wachapreague's ordinance that prohibits short-term vacation rental homes in residential areas is "perfect." Duer said.

He recommended that Exmore adopt the same ordinance.

The Wachapreague ordinance allows only five short-term rental homes in the town, which has a population of about 250.

Northampton concerned citizens continue to clamor for the county to regulate short-term vacation rental homes, without results.

Sheryl Dalessio, of Hungars Beach Road, Eastville, told Northampton supervisors at their Jan. 9 meeting that a minor special-use permit should be required to operate a short-term rental home.

"This does not pose a major obstacle in the permitting process," she said.

Because adjacent property owners must be notified when a neighbor applies for a special-use permit, Dalessio said the permitting process "allows members of the community to have a voice."

"Anything less would only serve to silence a dissenting opinion," Dalessio said.

M.J. Golibart, an Eastville resident who operates a short-term rental business, disagreed.

Requiring a special-use permit for a short-term vacation rental "injects an amount of uncertainty in the process that is really ... untenable for most people," he said.

Permit applicants must pay fees and often are required to invest additional money and time in projects that are not guaranteed to be approved.

bart said.

He believes Northampton County could find a way to regulate shortterm rental homes without requiring special-use permits.

"There's really nothing special about renting a room in one's home. It's been done here on the Eastern Shore for centuries," Golibart said.

Debbie Campbell, of Silver Beach, spoke as a former Salisbury, Md., town council member and a professional with experience in community development, housing finance, and affordable housing.

She said that when Salisbury allowed something similar to short-term vacation rental homes, "it was a disaster. We lost our city. I don't think we'll ever get it back."

"What you do is you create a commercial ... valuation model in what had been housing stock for families. And all of a sudden, the housing prices go up because the market is pricing them based on their value as a commercial enterprise," Campbell said.

She noted that short-term vacation rental homes also compete with hotels and motels that "have invested a lot of money to be here, in all of their studies and their permitting and their engineering and their construction."

Campbell advocated for "truth in zoning" and for Northampton County to adhere to its comprehensive plan.

She said, "When you move into a community, for instance, a single-family neighborhood, you have a right to expect that certain things are not going to happen."

# RC&D Council served important purpose

It was a behind-the-scenes group quietly doing discreet but important work. The nonprofit Eastern Shore of Virginia Resource Conservation and Development Council, established in 1974, and others like it nationwide were geared to allow residents to develop and implement plans to improve their communities.

Among the RC&D's benefits was that, as a nonprofit, it could secure grants not available to muncipalities. The council's initiatives included improving water quality, establishing living shoreline demonstration projects, and coordinating the Eastern Shore of Virginia Watershed Roundtable.

But federal funding for the council ended 13 years ago. Still, the local RC&D soldiered on with a part-time coordinator, continuing to make a difference on the Eastern Shore.

The RC&D played a key role in achieving large-scale projects on the Eastern Shore, including dredging local waterways to ensure they remain accessible, improving harbors in waterfront towns, and installing the original seawall on Tangier Island.

But recently the council didn't have a director and was unsuccessful in securing grants to keep it going. The local RC&D closed its doors just like it operated — without a lot of fanfare or recognition. It was the last RC&D Council in Virginia.

That's a shame. Its importance and contributions over the last half-century certainly merited increased funding from local governments.

That increased funding would have allowed it to seek more grants to solve some of the Eastern Shore's problems, of which there are many. But now, there is one less group trying to solve them.

# NOTICE TO THE PUBLIC OF AN APPLICATION BY VIRGINIA-AMERICAN WATER COMPANY, FOR A GENERAL INCREASE IN RATES CASE NO. PUR-2023-00194

On November 1, 2023, Virginia-American Water Company ("Virginia-American" or "Company") filed with the State Corporation Commission ("Commission") an application ("Application") for a general increase in rates. The Company filed its Application pursuant to Chapter 10 of Title 56 of the Code of Virginia ("Code") and the Commission's Rules Governing Utility Rate Applications and Annual Informational Filings of Investor-owned Gas and Water Utilities.

The Company requests authority to increase its rates to produce additional annual jurisdictional sales revenues of \$19.7 million, a 30.16% increase over present pro forma revenues. Virginia-American states that this increase includes an annual water service rate increase of 315.2 million, or 29.00%, and a wastewater service rate increase of \$4.5 million, or 34.88%. The Company indicates that this rate request is based on a 10.95% proposed return on common equity.

In its Application, Virginia-American proposes to complete its third and final phase of the rate consolidation that moves the Company's district-specific rates for water service to a consolidated statewide single tariff pricing ("STP") rate structure over the course of three general rate cases. The Company states that its proposal recovers each class's revenue requirement through a single set of statewide minimum service charge rates and through volumetric rates that are specific to each rate class. Virginia-American proposes that the final phase of consolidating the Company's Purchase Water Surcharge ("PWS") occur at the PWS's next rate change following the issuance of a final order in this proceeding, as the PWS adjusts biannually on the first of January and June

The Company further requests that the Commission approve consolidated service connection fees across the Company's service territories. Specifically, Virginia-American is proposing a consolidated \$2,000 service connection fee for 3/4" service lines. Virginia-American states that it does not propose implementing the consolidated fee until after a final order is issued in this proceeding approving a final service connection fee and will continue to apply its current service connection fees during the period interim rates are in effect.

The Company proposes a revenue decoupling mechanism ("RDM") that it states is an alternative rate design mechanism that will function as an automatic rate adjustment clause Virginia-American states that the RDM compares the revenues collected under the traditional customer-facing rate design with the revenues that would have been collected through a straight fixed variable pricing rate design on a forward-looking basis and accrues the differences to be either credited to customers or collected from customers at a later time. The Company further states that it would make a filing with the Commission on or before January 31 each year, and Commission Staff ("Staff") and other parties would have 60 days to review any necessary reconciliation amount that would then be charged from April 1 through December 31 of that calendar year under the proposed RDM tariff. The Company proposes the RDM become effective after a final order in this proceeding approving the RDM.

Virginia-American also proposes a universal affordability tariff for water and wastewater service that would provide discounts both to the basic meter charge and to the volumetric charges on participating customers' bills whose bills for Basic Water Service are expected to exceed 2% of household income. Should the Commission approve the proposed universal affordability tariff, the Company requests that the final approved residential volumetric rates in this proceeding be calculated to incorporate recovery from non-participating customers of the amount of discounts provided based on an assumed 10% participation. Virginia-American further requests that it be permitted to defer the difference between the assumed discount incorporated into final rates and the actual discount provided, and the Company states that any deferred amounts would be reconciled annually and recovered or credited to customers through the Company's proposed RDM tariff. The Company also requests authority to defer the actual administrative costs, which the Company states will vary based on actual participation

In addition, the Company proposes to include electronic payment fees charged by the Company's third-party payment processor in the Company's cost of service. Virginia-American states that if approved by the Commission, customers would not be required to pay these thirdparty fees in order to pay their bills from the Company.

Virginia-American states that it completed the acquisition of the water system of the Town of Waverly ("Waverly System") on May 17, 2022. The Company now proposes to establish a new rate schedule for service to customers served by the Waverly System effective June 1, 2024. The Company further proposes that the rates for the Waverly System be gradually adjusted over the course of two rate cases, with the first adjustment occurring in this proceeding, to transition into the statewide STP structure.

Virginia-American states that it completed the acquisition of the assets of E.L. Goddard, Inc. ("Goddard Systems"), on August 2, 2023. The Company proposes to move the rates in the Goddard Systems, which is part of the Company's Eastern District, to align with its statewide tariff proposed in this Application.

The Company states that on June 27, 2023, it filed a petition ("Cape Charles Petition") seeking authority from the Commission to acquire the water and wastewater systems of the Town of Cape Charles ("Cape Charles Systems"). Virginia-American states that if the Cape Charles Petition is approved, the Company proposes the water rates for the Cape Charles Systems be consolidated with the Company's statewide STP rates and the wastewater rates for the Cape Charles Systems be consolidated with the Prince William wastewater rates. The Company further proposes that at the time it closes on the acquisition of the Cape Charles Systems, the existing Cape Charles rates be made interim and then adjusted following a final order in this proceeding, with the difference between the existing Cane Charles rates and the final rates approved in this proceeding being refunded to customers with interest.

The details of these and other proposals are set forth in the Company's Application. Interested persons are encouraged to review the Company's Application, testimony and supporting exhibits for the details of these proposals.

TAKE NOTICE that the Commission may adopt rates, charges and/or terms and conditions that differ from those appearing in the Company's Application and supporting documents and may apportion revenues among customer classes and/or design rates in a manner differing from that shown in the Application and supporting documents.

The Commission entered an Order for Notice and Hearing in this proceeding that, among other things, scheduled a public hearing on the Application. The Commission noted that the proposed revenue requirement, if approved, would result in an increase to customer bills. Pursuant to Code § 56-238, the Commission suspended Virginia-American's proposed rates and permitted Virginia-American to implement the proposed rate increase on an interim basis. subject to refund with interest, on and after May 1, 2024. The Commission did not permit the proposed consolidated service connection fee, the RDM or the universal affordability tariff to be implemented on an interim basis.

On September 24, 2024, at 10 a.m., the Hearing Examiner will hold a telephonic portion of the hearing, for the purpose of receiving the testimony of public witnesses. On or before September 18, 2024, any person desiring to offer testimony as a public witness shall provide to the Commission (a) your name, and (b) the telephone number that you wish the Hearing Examiner to call during the hearing to receive your testimony. On September 24, 2024, at 10 a.m., or at the conclusion of the public witness portion of the hearing, whichever is later, in the Commission's second floor courtroom located in the Tyler Building, 1300 East Main Street, Richmond, Virginia 23219, the Hearing Examiner will convene a hearing to receive testimony and evidence related to the Application from Virginia-American, any respondents, and the Commission's Staff.

# Chincoteague's Harper twins lead the Ponies

When Jake and Jordan Harper go one-on-one in the family driveway, it can get a little feisty. What else would you expect from competitive twins?

But who wins these sibling show-downs? Depends on who you ask.

"Definitely me," says Jake. "I've got that winning record."

"I disagree on that," says Jordan.

Still, there will be many more "rides" in the family driveway for years to come.

# Supervisors support citizen menhaden regulations

Northampton supervisors on Tuesday, Jan. 9, unanimously approved a citizen-submitted resolution stating the county's support of proposing state regulations for harvesting menhaden, a small, herring-like fish used in products such as fish oil health supplements, animal feed, and fertilizer.

The resolution states that "industrial Atlantic menhaden fishing should be prohibited within the waters of the Chesapeake Bay and three miles of all lands of the commonwealth" and the Virginia Marine Resources Commission should adopt this regulation.

Tom Burkett, a research and operations specialist for the University of Virginia at the Anheuser Busch Coastal Research Center in Oyster, presented the resolution to county supervisors on Jan. 9.

He clarified that the target of the proposed regulation is industrial menhaden reduction fisheries, so called because they conduct large-scale fishing operations and reduce, or process. their catch into fish-meal pellets or

These large-scale fishing operations use spotter planes that locate schools of menhaden to be caught in massive

"purse seine" nets.

Omega Protein is a Canadian-based company that owns an industrial menhaden reduction fishery in Virginia and exports products primarily to non-local economies.

About 90% of Virginia's menhaden quota for 2023, or 101 million pounds, was caught by industrial

Smaller-scale commercial fisheries, which catch menhaden to use as bait for crabbing and fishing, are not the target of the proposed regulation.

These fisheries are locally owned, support local economies, and redistribute their catch to the Chesapeake Bay food system, Burkett said.

About 10% of Virginia's menhaden quota for 2023, or 11 million pounds, was caught by commercial fishermen.

A renewed focus on the impacts of industrial menhaden reduction fishing was prompted by three incidents in July 2022, two of which were documented by VMRC, in which thousands of dead and rotting fish washed up in several locations on the Eastern

Omega Protein claimed responsibility for the two documented fish spills.

Virginia is the only state on the East Coast that permits industrial menhaden reduction fishing in state waters.

# Broadband project is nearing its completion

A project to expand high-speed internet access to over 70% of Accomack and Northampton county homes is nearing completion.

"It is our goal to provide ubiquitous coverage across the Eastern Shore, and that's what we're going to continue to do," said Accomack County Administrator Mike Mason, speaking on behalf of the Eastern Shore of Virginia Broadband Authority during the Accomack County Board of Supervisors meeting Wednesday, Jan. 17.

"We're down to the final stages" of the project, which will bring broadband passings to about 72% of Eastern Shore homes, he said.

The Virginia Department of Housing and Community Development awarded \$12.3 million for the broadband build-out project during its 2022 Virginia Telecommunications Initiative grant cycle.

Accomack and Northampton counties and the broadband authority provided an additional \$3.3 million in matching funds for the VATI grant, which is bringing high-speed internet to 14 areas on the Shore.

In Accomack, buildout in Captains Cove and Greenbackville is nearly complete, Mason said, and crews have finished laying fiber optic cable in Sanford, Saxis, Hacksneck, and Harborton.

They are awaiting drier ground to finish laying cable in some of the remaining areas, he said.

Accomack and Northampton partnered with the Broadband Authority to apply for another VATI grant during the 2023 application cycle, but the group was not among the 14 applicants to receive funding across the state.

The partners plan to apply for funds again this year through the new Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment Program, which was funded by the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act that President Joe Biden signed into law in 2021.

"We see BEAD as a tremendous opportunity to try to complete that (buildout to 100% of homes on the Shore), and it will be the next target grant application that the (broadband) authority will be pursing," Mason said.

Board of Supervisors Chair Robert Crockett added Accomack County has over \$1 million set aside for the grant, which requires 25% in matching funds.

# 911 system upgrades

A new regional 911 radio system is expected to be operational within the year.

"We are operating on some older legacy systems that have coverage problems and are not meeting our needs," said 911 Director Jeff Flournoy in an update to the Accomack County Board of Supervisors on Wednesday, Jan. 17.

"The new radio system's going to benefit public safety and others here on the Eastern Shore," including sheriff's offices, police departments, and dispatch centers in both counties, he said.

The Eastern Shore of Virginia Regional Radio System upgrades have been several years in the making, after a 2019 study found the Shore's public safety communications infrastructure and operations were "inefficient at best and in a worst-case scenario, life-threatening."

The systems use different frequencies, and the study found deficiencies in coverage and interoperability between dispatchers as they transfer calls to the appropriate agencies for response.



#### **MID-YEAR BUDGET** AMENDMENTS TO FEE SCHEDULE
