# School cafeteria workers strike back vs. criticism

Accomack school cafeteria workers defended themselves against the school board at a meeting Tuesday, April 2, in the wake of school board member Jason Weippert's claim that "the food service sucks" in the county and "school lunches are terrible."

In emotional comments, school system cafeteria workers upbraided Weippert and the school board for their criticism, saying the disapproval had continued on social media and had diminished morale.


Board Chair Janet Martin Turner apologized and said the school board's focus was to improve the quality of offerings — not to criticize workers themselves.

"I'm sorry that things were said," she said.

Later in the meeting, Weippert also said he wanted the quality of food to improve and he takes "full responsibility" for the ensuing controversy.

"My choice of words probably weren't the

# Jury clears driver of manslaughter charge in crash

A jury has cleared Jessica Greenlev Waterfield, the Oak Hall resident whose vehicle killed a woman on Nocks Landing Road in Atlantic on April 12, 2023, of an involuntary manslaughter charge.

The jury in Accomack Circuit Court deliberated just under two hours before finding the 37-yearold Waterfield not guilty of involuntary manslaughter on Friday, March 29.

The jury found Waterfield guilty of careless driving, a misdemeanor. Substitute Judge Tanya Bullock ordered that a presentence report be prepared before Waterfield's sentencing.

Erika Bailey, 27, of Parksley, was killed when she was hit by Waterfield's vehicle. Injured were her boyfriend, Duane Lee Turner, and their 6-year-old daughter.

Defense attorney Thomas Northam said criminal negligence required "a high degree of negligence," beyond simple or ordinary negligence.

"Simple or ordinary negligence is not enough to convict of involuntary manslaughter, according to the statute," he said.

The family was visiting Turner's mother on Nocks Landing Road when they decided to walk along the road with the child as she rode her bicycle, Turner testified.

They were hit by Waterfield's white 2021 Honda Pilot sport utility

Waterfield testified she was driving east toward Atlantic Road at about 6 p.m. on the afternoon of the crash to have dinner with her parents. She said her 3-year-old daughter, who had

been having problems with choking from mucus in her throat, was asleep and began coughing.

Waterfield said her car had a camera to monitor the child in her car seat but she could not see her because of the glare from the setting sun.

She said she reached back in an attempt to straighten up the child's head to aid her breathing but could not reach her.

"I heard the front end of my car hit something. I did not know what it was," she testified.

Bailey was thrown across Nocks Landing Road and died upon impact. Turner said he attempted to help her.

"She never responded," he said, weeping while on the witness stand telling the story of that day.

Turner and the child were seriously injured and taken to the hospital. Waterfield said she remained at the scene

until 9:30 p.m. while police investigated the accident.

Evidence presented was that the car's recording system showed the car was traveling between 55 and 57 miles per hour when she struck them and that the car's brake was never engaged.

The speed limit at that location is 40 mph. Testimony from an officer investigating the accident was that Waterfield was not impaired by drugs or alcohol and was not using her cellphone. Commonwealth's Attorney Spencer Morgan described the case as "tragic for the victim's family and the defendant and her family," but said, "She was going too fast and failed to pay attention."

He described her behavior as "gross and wanton negligence." He called Waterfield's actions "a gross indifference to human life."

# Ocean Breeze gets mail

On Chincoteague Island, rural mail delivery will return to the small community of Ocean Breeze for a big price that was paid by the U.S. Postal Service.

"We went to bat for them," Town Manager Mike Tolbert said on Monday, April 1, about getting mail delivered again in Ocean Breeze.

It was a collaborative effort that even involved a few U.S. Congress members, he said.

Ocean Breeze once had cluster mailboxes that "for one reason or another, are no longer there," Tolbert said.

For years, Ocean Breeze residents

have been getting their mail over the counter at the Chincoteague post office, he said.

The town negotiated with Virginia's postal manager and made a deal: USPS would supply the mailboxes and the town would install them, Tolbert said.

The new mailboxes will be bolted to a concrete pad, and a light will be installed overhead.

The town manager reported that USPS paid nearly \$100,000 for the set of 16 mailboxes.

"After getting a look at them, they're substantial," Tolbert said. "They're not like these little boxes you see around."

"She was driving 15 miles over the speed limit and not paying attention. She did not see them until she hit them."

Defense attorney Thomas Northam said criminal negligence required "a high degree of negligence, beyond simple or ordinary negligence." He told the jury to focus on the jury instructions prepared by the two attorneys. He said Waterfield's action did not rise to that level.

He said the jury must find "callous disregard for human life" to find a defendant guilty of involuntary manslaughter.

"Simple or ordinary negligence is not enough to convict of involuntary manslaughter according to the statute."

Two Pocomoke City Council newcomers were elected on Tuesday, April 2.

most professional words," he said.

Weippert said he never would admonish "anybody that works hard" and said his goal was to raise salaries for the school system's lowest earners, including cafeteria workers.

But the discord already had been sown.

"We are so unappreciated," said cafeteria manager Kristin Sterling, who said the school board derided lunches without actually trying them.

"I have yet to see you walk into any of the schools and try the food," she

Sterling also said county foodservice workers were mulling cutting back on helping with extra work for the schools because of the lack of appreciation.

"I think I speak for all food service that we are no longer going to be doing special events anymore, other than what our school asks us to do," she said.

Chincoteague cafeteria manager Melissa Taylor called Weippert's criticism "a personal attack on me and

my staff."

She thanked school board member Jesse Speidel for eating in the cafeteria she manages and appreciated his

But the overall criticism "brought me to tears," she said.

"We put our all into this," she said. "All this negativity has left me feeling completely defeated."

Several other speakers addressed the board, in person and in writing, in support of the cafeteria workers' efforts.

Turner stressed improving the quality of food was the main goal and the issue was not an attack on the school system's food service manag-

Turner said teachers have mentioned to her the the sugar-filled breakfast choices — chocolate doughnuts and the like — are a detriment to behavior.

Weippert agreed, saying children should get the best quality food.

"Quality is not expensive; its priceless," he said.

# Language of locker rooms, language of leadership

Accomack County School Board member Jason Weippert said during a public meeting on Tuesday, March 19, that the school system's "food service sucks." It was an instance of locker-room language being substituted for the language of leadership.

There was a time when language so coarse and carnal would not have been used by an elected official at an open meeting. It would have been considered lowbrow and in bad taste.

It would have constituted a stunning lack of refinement on the part of the speaker. It would have been embarrassing.

We don't ask our elected officials to be particularly skilled orators — few people are, it seems. And it has long been apparent that people who receive the most votes in an election aren't necessarily those with uncanny rhetorical talent.

However, we do hope they demonstrate a modicum of polish and professionalism when they hold forth — especially those representing a school system. It's best for them to set a good example and stay away from such obvious vernacular inelegance.

Slipping away in our civil discourse is the line between lewd and prude. Of course, any high school student paying attention in English class realizes that some of the treasured works of literature — by Chaucer, Shakespeare, and the like — contain humorous vulgarities and bawdy euphemisms. Hopefully, students still read Chaucer and Shakespeare in schools, for their timeless plots, characters, and commentary on the human condition — and for the sheer fun of doing so.

But in our culture at large, communication is becoming more tawdry. The words and photos on social media, for example, are incessantly crass and tacky.

From our local leaders, we want the language of leadership — inspirational, motivational, congenial, well-conceived, thoughtfully made, and intelligent.

We should insist on it.

# Pay attention to safety with ATVs

Landowners who feel connected to the great outdoors on their all-terrain vehicles should keep some critical safety tips in mind.

Safety is especially important in mountainous counties of Southwest Virginia, according to Curt Porterfield, training coordinator for Virginia Tech Environmental Health and Safety.

"Just in the area, ATV-related injuries and deaths are up nearly 30% since 2021," he said. "The average hospital stay from an ATV-related injury is about 7.5 days, costing an average of \$127,000."

Five hundred people die in the U.S., and another 100,000 are seriously injured while operating ATVs every year.

"And 11,000 of those emergency room visits account for children," Porterfield continued.

He added that adults should lead by example. Of disclosed

ATV injuries, only 10.3% of adults reported wearing their helmet — a critical safety measure, as an average human skull is comparable to the hardness of a watermelon.

Selecting properly sized personal protective equipment is crucial in any ATV activity, said Matt Nuckols, Virgnia Farm Bureau's safety coordinator.

"In addition to modern, well-fitting protective gear, it's

important that riders read their owner's manual thoroughly, to know the vehicle's hazards and limitations," he added.

Some manufacturers now offer protection systems for rollovers — the most common type of ATV incident, which often occurs in hilly areas.

When navigating steep terrain, Porterfield advises limiting the slope to 15 degrees.

"If not, it's better to go sideways and be able to lean and reduce rollover risk. Know how to fight the gravity," he said.

In an AgriSafe webinar, Porterfield said safely enjoying ATVs comes down to four simple rules: Wear your helmet, know your terrain, control your speed, and avoid steep slopes.

"If we can help people manage those, then we could get that number well below 100 or more fatalities on ATVs," he said.

# Reminiscing about the grandest school cafeteria meals

I'm not ashamed to say some of the grand meals of my life were whipped up in a school cafeteria.

The pre-Thanksgiving turkey lunch at the original Northampton Middle School in Machipongo was a true culinary treasure.

Foreign dignitaries at a White House reception don't eat as well.

The turkey was succulent. The accompanying vegetables were seasoned perfectly. The delicious gravy was a masterpiece.

Still, it wasn't the best school lunch I ever had.

School lunches don't get much love. Apparently there are federal regulations these days requiring schools hew to nutritional guidelines, making feeding students challenging.

But the recent local debate involving the quality of school lunches, or lack thereof, made me daydream about my old school lunches.

It is hard to conjure up the words to describe the aroma of freshly baked rolls from the school cafeterias of my childhood.

It smelled like peace and plenty. It smelled like Jesus himself was back in the kitchen, mixing the dough and pulling rolls out of the oven.

In my experience, every good school cafeteria had at least one older lady who referred to students as "baby" or

"honey."

On some days, I would forget my homework, fail every test, get in trouble with the principal, and have a punishment waiting for me when I got home.

But the lunch lady still referred to me as

"darlin'," and she made me feel there was one adult in the world who wasn't mad at me. I loved her for it.

I spent five years attending elementary school in Delaware and one of the best school lunches included a "flying saucer" as a main dish.

It was a turkey-and-cheese sandwich on a hamburger bun that had been wrapped in aluminum foil and steamed.

Not only was it delicious, we kept the aluminum foil, rolled it into a small ball, and threw it at kids on the playground after lunch.

In fifth grade, we could buy small milkshakes and soft pretzels in the cafeteria. I felt like I was eating at a food court in a shopping mall.

In sixth grade, at Capeville Elemen-

tary School in Northampton County, we could buy a Stewart Sandwich — or a Stewart Sandwich pizza — in the cafeteria for lunch.

Some people aren't cultured enough to know what a Stewart Sandwich is, unfortunately. It was a sandwich in a sealed plastic bag ready to be popped in the microwave.

I trace the beginning of the decline of our nation and world to the day I was starving and they had stopped selling Stewart Sandwiches at my nearby Shore Stop store.

At Northampton High School, I usually bought a cheeseburger and a couple of cinnamon buns in the cafeteria and ate lunch with my friends in the vocational agriculture shop.

I hope and pray students these days still have the opportunity to grab their lunches, leave the chaos of the cafeteria, and eat instead in the vocational agriculture shop.

But the best school lunch I ever had — be still, my heart — was ham and cabbage at the original Northampton Middle School.

It wasn't just a lunch. It was a special occasion. I almost felt like I should dress up for it.

I dined on it several times — over the years, I was a student, student teacher, substitute teacher, and full-time teacher at the original Northampton Middle School.

I excelled at none of the four roles, but I did enjoy lunch.

The school had the Parthenon of school cafeteria kitchens and the workers there were Greek goddesses. At least I thought so.

When ham and cabbage was served, I entered the cafeteria with reverence and humility, knowing I did nothing to deserve the wondrous meal that awaited.

The cabbage was tender and toothsome and had been cooked and coated with delicious ham drippings.

Swished around in the warm cabbage were pieces of salty, sapid ham. And then it was all so perfectly seasoned. I ate until I ached and then returned for another helping.

"Have some more cabbage, sweetheart," the lunch lady said, scooping a steaming spoonful on my lunch tray.

I hope they still serve ham and cabbage in school cafeterias on the Eastern Shore. I hope Jesus himself is still baking the homemade rolls.

And I hope the lunch ladies still say "baby" and "honey," when they address the children.

# Town will cut tax rate to offset assessments

The town of Exmore is proposing a reduced real estate tax rate of 9.25 cents per \$100 of assessed value, roughly 23% lower than the current rate.

The lower tax rate is being proposed to offset property value increases averaging 24.5%, the results of Northampton County's 2024 real estate reassessments.

The majority of property owners will see only about a 1% increase in their tax bills.

"Most homeowners in Exmore are going to see a \$3, \$4, \$5, \$6 increase in their taxes," Town Manager Robert Duer said on Monday, April 1.

The Code of Virginia prohibits localities from using property reassessments to generate large increases in real estate tax revenue.

In a reassessment year, a locality may receive no more than 101% of the real estate tax revenue it received in the previous year — that is, 1% more in tax revenue.

rate must be reduced.

The reduced tax rate is called an equalized rate because it will result in the locality receiving roughly an equal amount of tax revenue as it received in the previous year.

Exmore's current real estate tax rate is 12 cents per \$100 of assessed value.

Applying this rate, a \$100,000 home would cost the owner \$120 annually in real estate taxes.

If the home's value increases to \$150,000 and the new tax rate of 9.25 cents per \$100 is applied, the owner's new tax bill would be \$138. Duer said.

The minimal tax increase "is not going to make or break us, but I think this will be fair," Duer said.

The total value of Exmore real estate increased from almost \$101 million to more than \$132 million.

The town collected about \$121,000 in real estate taxes last year and will collect about \$122,000 in real estate taxes this year if the equalized rate is adopted.

Councilman G.W. Adkins said, "I think it will be good for our people." All of those stated reasons to support destroying existing REAL affordable *housing* so that an expensive cluster development can replace prime farmland have no basis in fact, reality, or established code. They appear to be *simply false and* must not serve as a reason to approve this assault on our sacred rural quality of life.

If the Board approves this precedent on our prime agricultural lands at the expense of eliminating affordable home parks in the county, no farmland or Mobile Home Park in the county will be immune from the same destructive fate. Your recent tax assessments are just a down payment on what happens when we put cluster developments where crops grow now.

We **ALL** support economic development in this county...but our Comp Plan directs new housing developments to areas with services such as police, fire, EMS, sewer, water, grocery stores and "walkability".

We urge everyone to contact the Supervisors by emailing them at jwilliams@co.northampton.va.us asking that your comment be placed in the record of the Hionis debate. And again, on April 9th, we all have two

choices: stay in our homes and ignore this plea; or, come out to the 6pm meeting in Eastville and defend what you know and love about this unique rural county... before it's too late. Once we lose it, we can't get it back.

# Rooms to go

A late-19th-century house completed its journey halfway around Cape Charles and has been safely placed in its new location.

"We didn't have a single hiccup," said Kerry Shackelford, who owns the 1896 home and the parcel where the house was relocated on Washington Avenue.

The house was moved from its previous location in the historic district, on Mason Avenue, to make way for a new Taylor Bank branch.

The move began at 7 a.m. on Friday, March 29, and ended at approximately 11:15 a.m., about 45 minutes ahead of schedule.

At that time, the house was sitting on concrete blocks and ready for a permanent foundation, Shackelford said.

Expert House Movers, a Virginia Beach company, had scheduled five hours to complete the move to allow frequent stops for A&N Electric Cooperative workers to disconnect and move power lines so the elevated structure could pass through.

The raised home was transferred to a platform on wheels and towed just like a trailer, Shackelford said.

He had appeared before the Cape Charles Historic District Review Board in early January to seek a permit to move the house.

Shackelford successfully made the case for moving the historic district home by explaining that the building had been so heavily modified that it was no longer historic, and the only other option was demolition.

A permit from the Virginia Department of Transportation also was required to move the house.

There is no plan yet for the future use of the building.

# Sounding rockets to study Monday's eclipse

Three sounding rockets will be launched in the afternoon on Monday, April 8, from the NASA Wallops Flight Facility to study how forms of everyday communication might be affected by the sudden change in sunlight to the earth's ionosphere during a total solar eclipse.

The Atmospheric Perturbations around Eclipse Path mission, or APEP, is part of an ongoing study and eclipse rocket campaign led by Aroh Barjatya, professor of engineering at the Space and Atmospheric Instrumentation Laboratory at Embry-Riddle University in Daytona Beach, Fla.

The sounding rockets will launch at various times during the eclipse — 45 minutes before peak, during the peak, and 45 minutes after peak — to study these perturbations, or changes, in the ionosphere.

According to NASA officials, the only possible weather-related deterrent to the launch will be excessively high winds.


Sounding rockets are launched into space along a parabolic trajectory, at lower speeds and over a shorter duration than other rockets, and they don't go into orbit, which creates an ideal situation to collect scientific data.

They are also relatively low-tech and less costly than other rocket systems.

"These rockets don't need to be cutting edge; they just need to work," said Barjatya.

However, this project represents a decrease in number and improvement in technology from the 32 sounding rockets that were launched from Wallops on March 7, 1970, when the Shore experienced 99% totality during a total solar eclipse.

Barjatya explained that in this mission, each rocket will release four secondary instruments roughly the size of 2-liter soda bottles to simulta-

neously gather data during the short flight that is expected to reach a maximum altitude of  $260\ \mathrm{miles}$ .

"So, it's similar to getting results from 15 rockets, while only launching three," he said.

This launch is a continuation of the APEP project that occurred in October 2023, in White Sands, N.M., during an annular eclipse over land.

The ionosphere is a charged layer of the upper atmosphere, roughly 55 to 310 miles above Earth's surface, that separates the lower atmosphere from space.

To explain what typically occurs there during the day, sunlight can pry electrons away from atoms to form what is described as a "sea of highly charged electrons and ions, said Barjatya.

At night, however, they slow down

and release back into neutral atoms, in a recurring cycle.

A perturbation is defined as a change from the norm caused by an outside influence. Different types of perturbations, such as weather disturbances, can affect the ionosphere on a frequent basis with little consequence.

However, the effects of a solar eclipse are a whole other ballgame.

Barjatya likens the ionosphere to a quiet pond with some gentle ripples. The eclipse, however, is like a motor-boat that suddenly rips through the pond, creating a significant wake.

"Understanding the ionosphere and developing models to help us predict disturbances is crucial to make sure our increasingly communication-dependent world operates smoothly," he said.

Here on the Eastern Shore, Bar-

jatya said we are not likely to experience a blackout or other major disturbance. He anticipates our devices might run a bit slower and that GPS systems might be somewhat affected.

# Eclipse trivia

- Syzygy: the term that describes when the sun, moon, and Earth align in a total eclipse.
- Corona: the outermost part of the sun's atmosphere, only visible during a total eclipse.
- The Diamond Ring: occurring roughly 10 seconds before totality, it's a spectacular burst of light at one edge of the moon before the corona emerges, which unmistakably resembles an engagement ring.
- Umbra: the shadow cast by the moon.
- Umbraphiles (aka, "shadow lovers"): eclipse chasers who passionately travel the world to view solar eclipses.
- Total solar eclipses only happen in a new moon.
- Saros Cycle: a period of 18 years, 11 days, and 8 hours used to predict the recurrence of solar and lunar eclipses. Saros is Greek for "repetition."
- This total eclipse is part of Saros 139, last occurring on March 29, 2006. It will next occur on April 20, 2042, and will only be visible in the U.S. in North Dakota and Montana.
- An odd-numbered Saros cycle eclipse "ascends," its path traveling south to north. Eclipses in even-numbered cycles descend, traveling north to south.
- Earth is the only planet in the solar system to witness a total solar eclipse.
- Temperatures could fall between 10 to 15 degrees during the eclipse.
- Breezes will stop, birds will roost, bees will return to their hives ... but, be forewarned, Eastern Shore residents: Mosquitos are likely to rise up from the marshes.

# Town scotches plan to sell property

The Exmore Town Council on Monday, April 1, voted unanimously not to sell land that a potential buyer wanted to use as a site to store five megawatts of electricity in batteries.

"If you've ever seen a battery catch on fire, you don't want that around," said Vice Mayor Thomas Lewis.

Patterson Enterprises Inc., a construction firm based in Arizona, had expressed interest in purchasing approximately two acres near Virginia Avenue, owned by the town of Exmore, for battery storage.

The parcel in Exmore is near A&N Electric Cooperative's Kellam substa-

tion.

Exmore Director of Utilities Taylor Dukes had received a letter from an ANEC engineer, which stated that the cooperative did not oppose the sale of the property.

Old Dominion Electric Cooperative, an electricity generation cooperative partially owned by ANEC, plans to install a second line from the Kellam substation to Cheriton, but the line would occupy the same easement area as the existing transmission line, the letter stated.

ANEC also plans to install additional equipment on either side of the fence on the existing substation property, the letter continued.

The cooperative "punted," said Town Manager Robert Duer.

"That's the best way to say it,"

Dukes agreed.

If Exmore were to sell the property to Patterson Enterprises, "this is not giving them the OK to do the project at all. They still have a lot of hurdles to jump," he said.

The town council held a closed session in March on the potential sale of town property.

Duer repeated a concern that he had expressed during the closed session about the potential sale.

"I don't know whether we do if it brings what they'd be willing to pay for it," he said.

Dukes reminded town council members that if a request for bids were made, they would not be obligated to accept any of the bids.

"Why sell it for a dime when you can get a dollar?" Duer asked. "If it

goes to auction, they're going to bid \$10,000 for it" — the land's approximate assessed value.

Dukes said the town could seek legal advice on the potential sale and make a request for bids in May.

Exmore would benefit from selling the property even if the buyer could not use the land as a battery storage site because the buyer would pay annual property taxes to the town, he added.

Duer requested authorization for himself and Dukes to negotiate the sale.

"I'm not in favor of selling it," said Councilman Chase Sturgis.

He made a motion not to advertise or sell the property, which passed unanimously.
