Oyster roast to benefit young waterman paralyzed in accident

Two years after a vehicle accident left him paralyzed, 22-year-old Kalab Robinson has spent a total of seven months in rehabilitation and is ready to get out more and spend time at his favorite places with family and friends.

His world changed on Aug. 6, 2022, when he was driving home from Cape Charles, where the young waterman had been practicing for a boat-docking contest.

Robinson, unaware that he was suffering from severe dehydration, passed out, and his vehicle crashed, breaking his neck at the C4 vertebra.

After several weeks in Sentara Norfolk General Hospital, Robinson was released. His mother, Maria Stevens, advocated for him to be transferred to the Shepherd Center in Atlanta for rehabilitation.

ELECTIONS

Voter turnout strong in Northampton

About 68% of Northampton County's registered voters turned out to vote in the 2024 election and cast 6,811 ballots.

In the contest for U.S. President, Northampton voters gave 3,547 votes, or 52.56%, to Democrat Kamala D. Harris and 3,132 votes, or 46.41%, to Republican Donald J. Trump.

A majority of Northampton voters likewise supported the Democratic candidates for Congress: Sen. Timothy M. Kaine received 3,625 votes, or 54.64%, over Republican Hung Cao's 3,002 votes, or 45.25%, and Democrat Missy Cotter Smasal received 3,341 votes, or 49.83%, over Republican Jen A. Kiggans' 3,274 votes, or 48.83%.

This was not an election year for the Northampton's board of supervisors or school board, but six towns held elections for mayor, town council, or both.

Cheriton will have a new mayor, former town clerk Stacey A. Sparrow, who defeated incumbent Larry E. LeMond. Sparrow received 154 votes, or 64.17%, to LeMond's 81 votes, or 33.75%.

There were eight candidates for the six seats on the Cheriton Town Council. The winners were: challenger Terri Lynn Tatem, 164 votes; incumbent B.B. "Barry" Downing Jr., 163 votes; incumbent Robert K. "Bo" Lewis Sr., 153 votes; incumbent Norma P. Spencer, 147 votes; incumbent Jason Bryan Sparrow, 131 votes; and challenger Sheila M. Traina, 93 votes.

The unsuccessful candidates for the Cheriton Town Council were challenger Kandy A. Pena, 63 votes, and incumbent Ivan Pena, 52 votes. Councilman Greg Hardesty did not run for re-election.

In Belle Haven, which is part of both Northampton and Accomack counties, incumbent Mayor George H. Ludlow Jr. was victorious over challenger Lawrence Burr Willcox II.

Northampton voters gave Ludlow 28 votes, or 77.78%, and Willcox four votes, or 11.11%.

The five candidates who ran for and will serve on the five-member Belle Haven Town Council are Cecil Mears Ashby, Larry S. Baxter, Troy A. Brown, Edwin R.

Long, and Douglas R. Wehner.

H. Allen Floyd III ran unopposed for Belle Haven's recorder.

Two incumbent mayors ran unopposed for re-election: Eastville Mayor James C. Sturgis, who received 127 votes, and Nassawadox Mayor Patsy Stith, who received 202 votes.

There were eight candidates for the six seats on the Eastville Town Council. The winners were: incumbent D. Allen Philpot III, 112 votes; challenger Bonny W. Lewis, 96 votes; incumbent Anne G. Sayers, 96 votes; incumbent Eleanor C. Gordon, 86 votes; and challenger Diane L. Crockett, 79 votes.

There was a tie for the sixth Eastville Town Council seat: challenger John D. Crockett and incumbent Barbara M. Thomas each received 54 votes. Challenger Leslie A. Shifflett trailed by one, receiving 53 votes.

Only three candidates ran for the six seats on the Nassawadox Town Council: incumbents Andrea D. Fox, 131 votes; John W. Hallett Sr., 128 votes; and Thomas Wilson Rippon Jr., 124 votes. The winners of the remaining three seats on the Nassawadox Town Council will be determined by write-in votes, of which there were 68.

Cape Charles Mayor Adam Charney was not up for re-election this year, but nine candidates vied for three seats on the Cape Charles Town Council. The three successful candidates were incumbent Andrew J. "Andy" Buchholz, 456 votes; challenger Tara S. Ashworth, 367 votes, and challenger Clayton H. Newman, 279 votes.

The six runners-up were: Edward B. "Ed" Wells, 264 votes; Carol L. Sabo, 252 votes; Mark L. Usry, 221 votes; Jo M. Bronson, 172 votes; Martin W. Beckett, 85 votes; and John B. Rowe, 40 votes.

Exmore Mayor Doug Greer also was not up for re-election this year. Three Exmore Town Council incumbents ran unopposed for re-election: Thomas R. Lewis, 334 votes; Chase E. Sturgis, 304 votes; and John C. "Coby" Metz, 261 votes.

A special election was held to replace one Exmore town councilman, the late T. Bradley Doughty. Claudia C. Andrews ran unopposed for that seat and received 436 votes.

Nandina added to list of invasive plants

Thirteen more species that pose a threat to the state's ecosystems have been added to the Virginia Invasive Plant Species List.

The additions include Italian arum, nandina, and orange-eye butterfly-bush.

Invasive plants are non-native species that cause harm or have the potential to cause harm to natural resources, economic activity or humans. Some have been introduced intentionally into a region where they did not evolve; others, accidentally.

The Virginia Department of Conservation and Recreation has determined that the plants on the list, which now includes 103 species, threaten Virginia's forests, marshes, wetlands, and waterways.

The list, which has no regulatory authority, is for educational purposes and is updated regularly. For the full list, go to: <https://tinyurl.com/zitcnwzz>

Factors considered during assessment of potential additions to the list include the invasive characteristics of the species such as how readily seeds are dispersed through the landscape, whether Virginia has suitable habitat, and if the species threatens natural resources.

There are three ranks of invasiveness: high, medium, or low.

Invasive plants cause problems because they proliferate and displace native plant species, reduce wildlife habitat, and alter natural processes.

The following plants were added to the list of Virginia Invasive Plant Species: in the highly-invasive category, Chinese tallow-tree, floating primrose-willow, Italian arum, raven-

na-grass, trifoliolate orange, and two-horned trapa.

In the medium level invasive category: curled pondweed, fountain grass, incised fumewort, leatherleaf mahonia, sweet autumn clematis.

In the low-level invasive category: nandina and orange-eye butterfly-bush.

The state's Invasive Species Working Group, created by the Virginia General Assembly in 2009, is coordinating efforts to address invasive species and is updating its management plan.

The Department of Conservation and Recreation provides a free, online Virginia Native Plant Finder tool to search for native species to plant instead of invasives.

Find out about the proposed plans and major design features for a project to convert the existing intersection at Route 13 (Lankford Highway) and Route 648 (Daugherty Road) to a restricted crossing U-turn (RCUT) in Accomack County. The proposed project is designed to improve overall safety issues at this location, such as insufficient turn lane and taper lengths, as well as the lack of median crossover delineation.

Come see the proposed plans designed to reconfigure the intersection to an RCUT, install new lighting, and construct two bulb-out shoulder extensions in each direction on Lankford Highway to provide additional room for larger vehicles making U-turn maneuvers.

swim against the current and put students first.

Since day one, new and incumbent school board members have been met with unrelenting hostility. They've been called racist, threatened with lawsuits, and bullied by the minority.

While the author of last week's letter insists that school boards should be bipartisan, one would be very naive if they didn't already know that the Democratic Party was in control of the school board for the last 20 years. They control the Virginia School Board Association, where all their legal documents come from, and the local education association for at least the last 20 years as well.

A good example was the crowd who formed at the school board meeting to protest against a raise for the superintendent being taken back after it was clearly not given.

Votes taken by this school board have been 9-0, 7-3, 5-4 and everything in between, disproving the author's assertion that the board is strictly partisan to one side.

A Shore native remembers World War II massacre in Europe

On Dec. 20, 1944, our Reconnaissance Office (half-track), of which I was chief of section of Battery “A,” 391st Armored Field Artillery Battalion, passed through Spa, Belgium, and then through a large gasoline storage area in a wooded area between Spa and La Gleize.

We set up a communication relay station because radio reception and visibility were very poor.

On Dec. 21 we got orders to report to a task force in Stoumont but could not get by a column of tanks and got stuck in a stream when we tried to bypass them on a trail.

We then got a call to report to Col. Lovelady’s headquarters, as Stoumont was not in our hands. A Capt. Peters told us to report to Lt. Edmark of “D” Company, 33rd Armored, a task force of CCB, 3rd Armored Division, in the village of Parfondrui, to give artillery support.

We were escorted part of the way and were told to move fast as the Germans had observation on the road. We did move fast.

When we rounded a corner and stopped beside the first house on our right, there was a building on fire and lighting up the sky as it became dark.

Lt. Plummer, our new forward observer, said he would go ahead on foot and make contact with “D” Company and make sure it was in our hands so all of us wouldn’t get captured.

Meanwhile some of the people came out of the house and asked for help, as there were several wounded inside.

William Whitten, Roland McNiece, and Howard Jenkins went in and began to administer first aid while the rest of our section stayed on the guns.

About the author

Charles Robert Corbin was born in 1924 near Hallwood to Charles Robert Corbin Sr. and Etta Riggin. He spent much of his childhood with his grandparents, Henry and Clarissa Moore Riggin, in Willis Wharf and vividly remembers Henry’s store in Willis Wharf, the Willis Wharf railway for boats that the family operated, and the local seafood he sold.

After Corbin graduated from Atlantic High School, he worked at Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock for about six months and then was drafted into the U.S. Army for World War II.

He elected to go overseas and fought in the Battle of the Bulge. In December 1944 he was badly wounded. He was transported to a hospital

in Paris, France, and stayed there for about seven months while recovering. He then went to Selma, Ala., to learn to use his hands again.

In 1961, he married Margaret Mackey. She passed away in 2023 after 62 years of marriage.

After returning to the United States, Corbin worked at the Chincoteague Naval Air Station, the Pentagon in Washington, D.C., and at Naval Air Station Patuxent River.

He loved to fish and was an avid golfer. He retired to a Whispering Pines, N.C., golfing community, where he played golf daily while he was able.

Corbin continues to live in North Carolina. He will be 100 years old on Dec. 10.

We had three .30-caliber gun and one .50-caliber machine gun.

We soon got a signal from Plummer to come on in. We passed the burning building on our right and met Plummer at the first corner intersection and then to Lt. Edmark’s C.P., who had made room for us in a room there. It was very cold.

A difficult discovery

We covered the windows and built a fire. I got out my favorite stove, a non-issue blow torch, and heated up some 10 in 1 rations.

Lt. Edmark came in while we were eating and gave us the lowdown, or the big picture, as they used to say. We had nine tanks, a platoon of infantry and mortars, and a few engineers and medics, and we had to hold our position.

Lt. Edmark had led “D” Company from Petit-Coo to take possession of Stavelot but was stopped at the edge

of Parfondrui on the Coo road by large numbers of infantry and tanks in the afternoon.

They had killed lots of Germans and knocked out several tanks and had a few prisoners. The fighting was ending as we arrived.

In the night, instead of sending Bed Check Charlie, the Germans sent a couple of buzz bombs that shook us.

The next morning while scouting our position, I entered a house and saw a dead elderly couple, bullet holes in their heads, their throats cut, lying in their blood.

Another house had two women and a baby dead in a crib. One of the women was nude with a bullet hole in her head and part of her left arm hacked off. I was at a corner standing in a yard when two children appeared like out of the fog, and said: “Vive L’Amerique.”

One of our soldiers stopped them and told them not to enter the house as the people were dead. They said

they were looking for their parents and relatives and went in. I went back to our C.P. in a daze.

William Whitten and I had just pushed the 20-year age mark fewer than two weeks earlier. It was hard to get our minds back on the war.

‘We were isolated’

All afternoon we could see the German troops across the railroad marching on the Stavelot road toward Trois-Ponts but could not see our artillery shells because of haze and fog.

I went upstairs in a house on a hill behind us to observe better. There, under our nose, was a large German tank in some trees.

After telling Lt. Plummer and Lt. Edmark, we got artillery on it and flushed it out where one of “D” Company’s tanks had a clear shot at it.

And shoot it he did, but three balls of fire bounced off, and it backed away, never moving its turret. It had to be a Mark VI Tiger. It made us all wonder, and I know the tank gunner was shaking his head, feeling helpless, as it backed up the railroad on our left flank.

I had seen our 75s bounce off Mark V and VI tanks before, the last time near Roetgen (Germany), where they wiped out several of our tanks.

This tank fire started a lot of fire on us as the Germans answered back, and some 155s of our own came in on us. It took us a while to get this stopped.

A message came in on our radio for Lt. Edmark from Col. Lovelady, as we had the only radio to reach outside. The Coo road had been taken by the Germans and our infantry was ordered out.

We were isolated and feared the Germans would try to come through us to get our gasoline supply.

We mounted our three .30-caliber machine guns in the windows upstairs and down and sat up all night waiting. No one slept, but the attack never came.

‘His aim was good’

On Dec. 23, we saw a concentration of enemy infantry and tanks building up as if about to attack. Lt. Edmark and Lt. Plummer decided to pull Edmark’s tank “Dixie” beside our C.P. and use it for indirect fire on the Germans, as it had a 76 gun.

I went upstairs to my observation post of the day before to observe with Plummer standing on the tank.

The tank fired three times, and I could see the Germans head for cover of the woods. They were between 2,000 and 3,000 yards away. After the third shot, a German tank, probably the one I had observed the day before, fired back either at the tank or at Plummer or me.

If it was on me, his aim was good but not perfect, as the shell came through the wall of the room just to my right, knocking me down, breaking both hands and sending three pieces of shrapnel into my head.

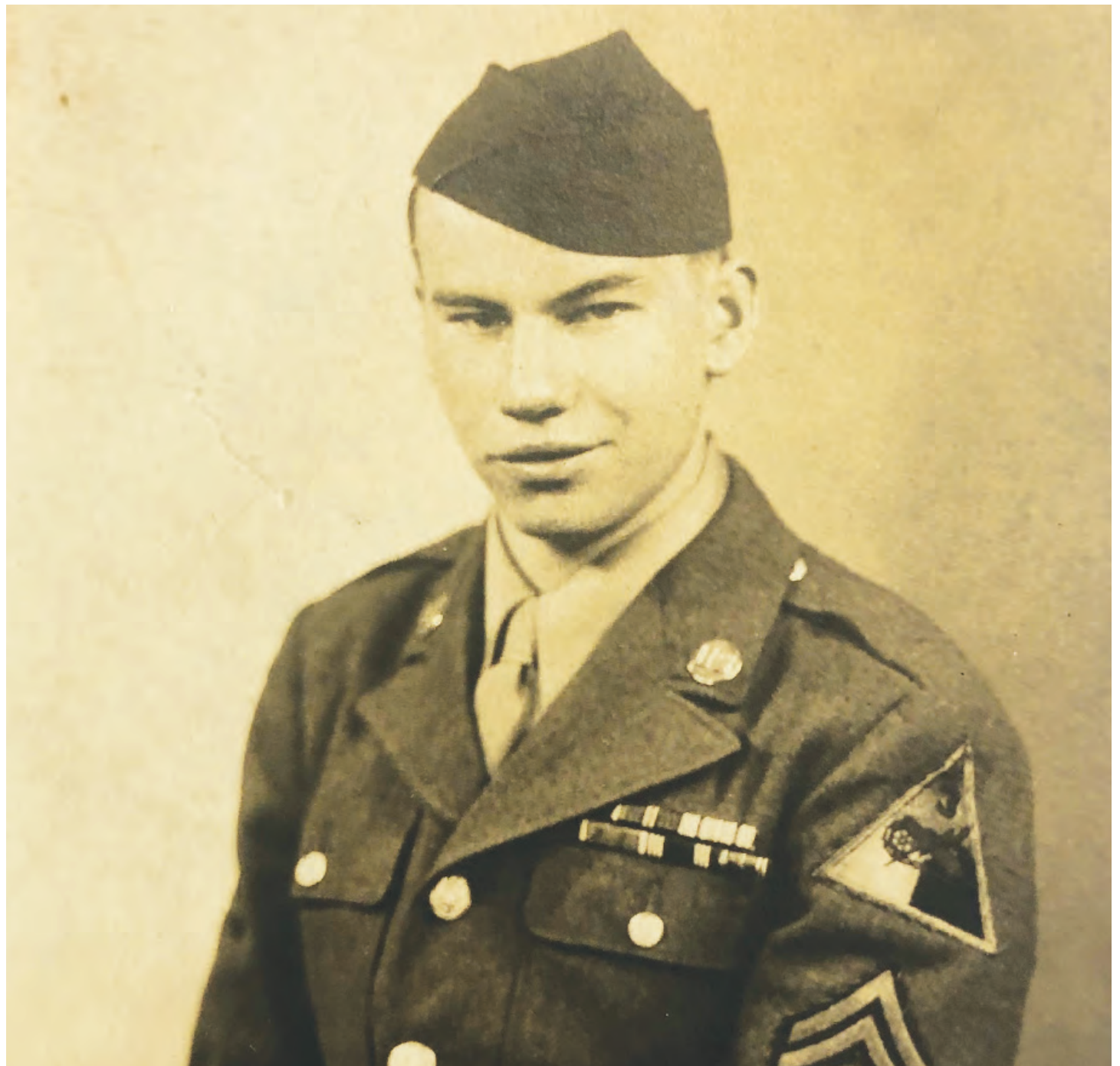
I couldn’t get the door open with my hands, thinking another shell was coming, but I got help with a prayer to open it.

The medics found me in the snow and helped me to the C.P., patched me up, and said they would try to get me out, as they had another wounded man.

Christmas Cognac

I told the guys in my section that I had two bottles of Cognac in my duffle bag for Christmas.

Lt. Edmark came in and said good

luck, and I said the same to him. They put my P-38 (can opener) on the stretcher. As the medic half-track went across the ridge, the Germans shot at us, with the shells landing close, but they didn’t stop until we got to a roadblock of our own empty vehicles.

When the door opened I expected to see Germans, but it was our med-

ics checking on us.

We arrived at a large chateau used as an aid station on the lower left, with the upper right used as a headquarters and having a terrace.

I recognized my battery commander, Capt. Paul Nelms. I was given a shot. The chaplain came and said, “Let’s pray,” and I said I had already done that, and I went to sleep.

Christmas Day I was on a train near Paris to another hospital, and someone fed me Christmas dinner — a peanut butter and jelly sandwich.

I had no regrets, except I left my P-38 in the ambulance.

I didn’t get any Christmas Cognac, but the memory of the massacre of Parfondruy I still have.



Town council doesn't act on new development ordinance

The Exmore Town Council declined to act on a proposed ordinance for planned unit developments, or PUDs, following a public hearing on the matter on Monday, Nov. 4.

No comment provided during the public hearing supported Exmore taking immediate action on planned unit developments.

Before considering a PUD, "at a minimum, a developer should submit a detailed and exhaustive plan for the creation of a PUD district," said Carl Nordstrom in a written comment.

That plan should include "detailed site plans, environmental impact analysis, transportation studies, surveys, a master development plan, and profers to offset the economic impacts of such on the town of Exmore," he wrote.

Bob Myers said an economic impact study is needed before the town gives any consideration to a PUD.

He also was concerned with the impact of increased housing density in the town.

In August, Atlantic Group developer Chris Carbaugh visited an Exmore Town Council meeting to propose a PUD of nearly 500 homes that would occupy more than 150 acres.

During that meeting, Town Manager Robert Duer said that Exmore had the potential to grow to the size of Chincoteague, with a population of about 3,000, or Pocomoke City, with a population of about 4,000.

But Exmore town officials and residents have noted that if the town's population grows beyond 2,000, it will lose the special sewer rate that was negotiated with the Hampton Roads Sanitation District, and the town's sewer rate will approximately double.

Exmore's current population is less

than 1,500.

Duer also noted that the town would have to raise tax revenue to pay for additional police officers and expanded services such as municipal water and trash pickup.

Ken Dufty echoed those statements during the Nov. 4 public hearing.

"When you start building \$400,000 to \$600,000 houses, everybody's taxes are going to go up" to pay for additional police, fire-fighters, emergency services, trash collection, and public works," he said. "Development never makes taxes go down."

Tim Costello asked, "What's in it for me? So there's this PUD that's being planned ... with these amazing amenities ... but it seems like the cost of that or the collateral cost of that's going to end up out of my pocket."

Debbie Campbell, a former Salisbury resident and city council member, cautioned against the consequences of unchecked development.

She described one Salisbury housing development: "The roads weren't built properly. The storm drainage wasn't built properly. The infrastructure was horrible. People are still suffering. The taxpayers in Salisbury are ponying up a ton of money."

Furthermore, communities often fail to account for the impact of housing developments on the local schools, and the communities wind up going into debt that they can't repay to build new schools, Campbell said.

She said that rushing to start a planned unit development would be a "mistake."

Duer advised the town council to forgo action on the PUD ordinance until at least two or three developers made offers, and the council members agreed.

Mitchell lands humongous flounder

A mixed bag of fishing reports is coming over the gunnels this week. The autumn Chesapeake Bay striped bass run has, so far, been slow to materialize, with warm water temperatures probably being the culprit. Positive reports are starting to trickle down from the Maryland portion of the bay, so numbers of fish should, hopefully, begin to show up soon.

Although the warm water temperatures can be blamed for the delay in the rock-

fish arrivals, they should receive credit for keeping a substantial population of puppy drum and speckled trout around, resulting in good fall action with those species. The ocean wrecks are holding good numbers of medium-sized bluefish, black sea bass, and a nicely sized class of flounder.

Upper Shore

Captain CL Marshall, with Tangier Sound Charters, told me that the traditional upper Chesapeake Bay autumnal rockfish pattern has finally started to develop. He has found most of the stripers way up inside the tidal creeks, with the fish concentrated along steep marsh banks with dropoffs from the marsh edges down to 15 feet in depth.

Feeding rockfish have also been found in the small feeder creeks, with the fish holding tight to the banks along areas of flowing water. Slot-sized rockfish have also started showing up over some of the deeper water submerged structures. A little farther north, schools of feeding rockfish have been found under

schools of diving birds, just north of Bloodsworth Island.

Red drum are still being encountered in areas of shallow water, where they have been caught by anglers sight casting, according to Captain Marshall.

Chincoteague

Jimmy Vasiliou, at Captain Steve's Bait and Tackle, reported that fishing in the back bays has produced flounder, small speckled trout, and upper slot-sized puppy drum.

Surf fishermen on Assateague Island have been landing kingfish (whiting) and puppy drum.

Bountiful catches of bluefish, sea bass, and flounder are occurring on the inshore ocean wrecks.

Farther offshore, large black sea bass have taken residence over the deep-water wrecks. The blue water trolling fishery was described as "pretty good."

Wachapreague

Captain Lindsay Paul, aboard the *Almost Persuaded*, commented that there has not been "a lot" of angling activity going on out of Wachapreague this week.

He said that there were a "few flounder still around," but most of the remaining flounder have been undersized.

He had heard of some recent slot-sized puppy drum catches.

Black sea bass remain available on the offshore wrecks. Captain Paul had received reports of tuna, dolphin (mahi mahi), and a few billfish catches in the offshore waters.

Lower Shore

Jeb Brady, at Bailey's Bait & Tackle, said that the recent puppy drum action has been "on fire" along the lower Chesapeake Bay creeks, as well as on the seaside out of Oyster. He said that anglers have been finding large schools of puppies feeding heavily as they begin their southerly seasonal migration. A large percentage of the drum have fallen within the slot-size, so anglers have been able to claim their three-fish possession limit. A majority of the successful drum anglers have been casting Berkeley Gulps or Down South soft plastics with success.

Jeb said that there are a few quality-sized speckled trout being caught on the lower bayside on Mirrolures.

The recent flounder action remains good along the Chesapeake Bay Bridge-Tunnel for anglers dragging strips of cut bait and Gulp along the

bottom. The tautog bite along the bridge-tunnel continues to improve with the falling water temperatures, with chunks of blue crab being the most productive tog bait.

When Robinson arrived at rehab, the only movement he could make below his neck was shrugging his shoulders.

Some thought he had little chance to improve, but his family believed in him, Stevens said.

After two separate stays at the Shepherd Center, one for four months and another for three months, Robinson regained much of the use of his arms and left hand and could independently brush his hair and teeth, his mother said.

He also has rebuilt his core strength enough to get in and out of his wheelchair by himself.

Maria Stevens said doctors had advised that it would take up to two years for her son's muscles to "wake up" for rehab.

That time passed without Robinson regaining any movement in his legs, meaning he is unexpected to walk again. He also is unable to move the fingers on his right hand.

However, Robinson is looking forward to a third trip to the Shepherd Center sometime in 2025 to build on his previous successes and work toward further independence.

He wants to learn how to dress himself next, Stevens said.

At the family residence in Machipongo, money from a previous fundraiser was used to add accessible features to the home, including a wheelchair ramp, interior sliding doors, and a roll-in shower.

Robinson is ready to "roll outside and see some people," but his current mode of transportation, a modified 12-passenger van, is less than adequate, Stevens said.

The portable wheelchair ramp that Robinson uses to get into the van weighs 70 pounds and can be difficult to handle, she noted.

The steep ramp becomes so slick when it's wet that it causes the wheels on Robinson's wheelchair to spin, preventing him from entering the van and traveling when it rains.

The amount of space needed to accommodate the large vehicle and

wheelchair ramp also prevents him from attending events with limited parking.

At the top of the family's wish list is an accessible van with a built-in wheelchair ramp that locks safely in place, which will cost about \$20,000 to \$25,000 secondhand.

The accessible van will give Robinson more freedom to travel when he wants to go to his favorite places, accompanied by his favorite people.

He looks forward to being able to use the Eastern Shore's beaches and nature trails, attend concerts and festivals, have cookouts with his friends and visit with their families.

Robinson also needs reliable transportation so he can return to the work-

force. He has already received a couple of offers for jobs doing office work.

To raise the money for the accessible van, friends, family, and community members have come together to plan a benefit oyster roast that will also feature live music, barbecue, a cash bar, and a silent auction. Tickets are \$50 each.

The event will be held on Saturday, Nov. 16, from 3 to 9 p.m., at Scott Farms, 4301 Townsend Drive, Cape Charles.

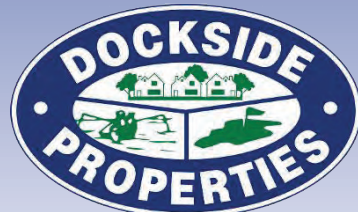

County, towns cast ballots in Nov. 5 election

Unofficial results on Thursday, Nov. 7, show 65% of registered voters in Accomack County cast ballots on Election Day for local, state, and national races.

So far, 17,213 votes have been tallied from a total of 26,300 registered voters.

This tally does not yet include early voting, absentee and late arriving ballots, or provisional ballots of individuals registering to vote on election day, according to Angel A. Shrieves, general registrar and director of elections for the county.

She said Friday, Nov. 8, is the cut-off date for late-arriving ballots. Shrieves and her staff will work on Nov. 11, a scheduled holiday, to process these ballots, along with those considered provisional and same-day.

Accomack County voters chose Donald J. Trump over Kamala D. Harris, with Trump receiving 9,479 votes, or 55.92%, to Harris' 7,333 votes, or 43.26%. Other candidates on the ballot received less than 1% of the vote.

In the U.S. Senate race, Republican challenger Hung Cao received more total votes (9,174) in the county than incumbent Democrat Tim Kaine (7,516), although Kaine was ultimately elected to another term in Congress.

In the 2nd District House of Representatives race, incumbent Republican candidate Jen A. Kiggans was elected to another term over Democrat challenger, Missy Cotter Smasal, with Kiggans receiving about 56% of the vote to Smasal's 42%. Other candidates made up the remainder of the vote.

In the town of Accomac, Councilmember Mark Kirby will be the new mayor, having run unopposed.

Kirby received 160 votes (99.91%), with write-in candidates receiving 16 votes.

Mayor Patricia Smith did not run for another term.

In Bloxom, Christopher F. Freisel ran unopposed for mayor and received

111 votes (90.24%). There were 12 write-in votes, representing 9.76%.

While there were several uncontested mayoral races in the county involving incumbents, perhaps the most interesting race for this position took place in Melfa, where no one officially ran on the ballot, with only write-in votes cast. There is no clear winner at this point.

Hallwood's mayor John W. "Jackie" Poulson was elected to another term with 40 votes, or 80% of ballots cast. In Keller, incumbent S. Beth Hart won another term as mayor, receiving 57 votes, or 95%. Fletcher D. Fosque will return as Onancock's mayor after receiving 501 votes (89.95%)

Incumbent Henry "Ned" Finney won the uncontested race for mayor in Onley, receiving 203 votes, or 93.12%. Painter's mayor, Connie Widgeon Campbell, was elected again with 88 votes, or 94.62%. Mayor Frank A. Russell was elected to another term in Parksley, receiving 269 votes, or 85.94%.

On Saxis Island, Denise L. Drewler went unchallenged and was elected again as mayor, receiving 86 votes, or 93.48%. Charles A. Elliott won another term as Wachapreague's mayor, with 136 votes, or 91.28%.

Contested mayoral races took place in Belle Haven, Chincoteague, and Tangier Island.

Belle Haven mayor George H. Ludlow Jr., won with 152 votes from Accomack County against contender Lawrence Burr Wilcox II, who received 30 votes.

Ludlow also received the most votes from Northampton County voters in this race. Belle Haven's municipal limits stretch into both counties.

Councilmember Denise P. Bowden will become Chincoteague's new mayor after defeating the incumbent, Arthur Leonard. Bowden received a total of 1,555 votes to Leonard's 841.

On Tangier Island, incumbent mayor James W. "Ooker" Eskridge defeated his challenger, vice mayor Cameron C. Evans, to serve another term. Es-

kridge received 130 votes to Evans' 98.

If he had been elected, Evans, who is 24, would have been the youngest mayor in Virginia.

Town council races

In Accomac, three of six council seats up for election were filled by Thomas E. Hines (141 votes), Victoria L. Mohagen (98), and Charles A. "Chip" Lewis (118). Write-in candidates received 94 total votes.

In Belle Haven, Edwin Long, Douglas R. Wehner, Cecil Mears Ashby, Larry S. Baxter, and Troy A. Brown will fill the five available town council positions.

Bloxom's six available council seats were filled by Samuel H. Bloxom, Jr. (76 votes), James T. Bagwell II (69), Thomas W. Beasley (69), Kasey G. Bagwell (63), Rosemary Gibbons (63), and Charles Edward Roe Jr. (53 votes).

Three seats were available on Chincoteague's town council, and incumbents William T. McComb Jr. and Gene Wayne Taylor were each elected to another term, receiving almost 50% of the collective vote between them. John N. "Nick" Howard was also elected, while Sonia D. Watson-Conser was not successful in her attempt for a council seat.

In Hallwood, Claude M. Linton (38 votes) and Pamela G. Riffey (36) likely will serve on town council, while write-in choices are likely to fill remaining seats (65 total votes).

Five candidates have been elected to fill the six available council seats in Keller: Anna Hart (47 votes), Teresa Guy (46), Linda Guy (42 votes), Rose Anna Moore (36), and Heather Littlefield (36). Write-in votes will determine the other winner.

In Melfa, the likely winners to fill some of the six seats on town council include James R. Wilson (142 votes), Raymond W. Lewis Jr. (125), Gregory J. Spady (115), and David A. Pefter (102). A total of 59 write-in votes were cast.

In Onancock, the three available council seats will be filled by Lisa Fiege

(396 votes), Omar S. Grubb (261), and Maphis M. Oswald (200).

Contenders Mary L. Clements, Geoffrey M. Daking, and Gregory T. Temple were not successful in their bids.

Seven candidates vied for six seats in Onley's town council: W. R. "Bill" Ferguson (148 votes), Jason A. Campbell (139), Woody W. Zember (139), Brian Corbin (124), Daniel Keith Bloxom Jr. (111), and Rodney C. Lang (108) were elected.

Arlene A. Evans (90 votes) was not elected. Seventeen write-in votes were also cast.

Six candidates will fill the six available seats on Painter's council. Elected were James N. Sturgis (59 votes), Thomas J. Willet (55), Eric Talmadge Harris (54), Josephine B. Hearne (47), F. C. Duer III (45), and Samuel Lewis (51).

In Parksley's election, voters chose three candidates to fill council seats: Richard A. "Ric" Taylor (257 votes), Janice Benton Welch (211), and Francis D. "Sam" Welch (207).

On Saxis Island, six candidates will fill the six available council seats. Elected were Denise E. Chance (92 votes), Beverly L. Hart (90), Aubrey Lee Miles (88), Wayne E. McCleary (79), Darren D. Marshall (77), and Bryan P. Shreaves (74).

In Wachapreague, six candidates ran for six seats: Stephen B. Joseph (115 votes), Sandie M. Puchalski (115), Glenn J. Schagelin (101), Aileen Z. Joeckel (95), Robert F. Bilecki (93), and Craig L. Baker (89).

The most contested council race took place on Tangier, with 11 candidates vying for 6 seats.

Successful candidates were: Elizabeth P. Thomas (168 votes), Sharon K. Haynie (152), William T. "Tommy" Eskridge (151), Kelly C. Wheatley (148), Tracy King Pruitt (136), and Anna E. Pruitt-Parks (124).

Michael R. "Tiny" Parks (95), Jan C. Marshall (70), Norwood C. Evans (86), and Bradley Allen Thomas Jr. (78) were not elected.

Northampton opens new QUEST classrooms

Northampton County Public Schools is excited to announce the opening of newly developed learning spaces at the QUEST Center, made possible with the support of the Northampton County Board of Supervisors and QUEST program director Laura Lembke.

The upgrades include four new content-specific classrooms, a lunchroom, a GED room, and a short-term suspension room, all designed to enhance the educational experience for QUEST students.

These improvements provide students with physical learning environments that foster growth and engagement.

The new spaces are especially beneficial for students who require extra support due to their academic challenges, offering them a positive environment to continue their education and succeed.

“With these new learning spaces,

we are better equipped to help students who may need a different setting to thrive,” said Lisa Martin, superintendent of Northampton County Public Schools. “Every student deserves the opportunity to succeed, and this expansion allows us to offer the support they need in a structured environment.”

The short-term suspension room allows students to stay engaged in their studies while addressing behavioral challenges.

In contrast, the GED room offers students another path toward obtaining their high school equivalency. These spaces reflect the district’s commitment to providing all students with the tools they need for success.

This program results from a partnership between Northampton County Public Schools and the Northampton Board of Supervisors, demonstrating a shared commitment to supporting student growth and education.

A&N Electric to file for rate increase

In response to continued inflationary pressures on material and labor, A&N Electric Cooperative will file a general rate case with the Virginia State Corporation Commission in the coming months.

If approved by the commission, the cooperative’s overall revenue will increase by no more than 9%.

Increases to individual rate classes will vary based on each class’ cost of service. The cooperative’s general rate case is based on 2023 revenues and expenses.

The proposed increase to electric rates will allow A&N to continue to recover the cost of operating and maintaining the cooperative’s distribution system, which delivers reliable and safe electricity to homes and communities.

As part of its general rate case, A&N will also request approval to implement demand charges as a separate line item for several rate classes.

Demand is the measure of how much total electricity a co-op member is using at any given time.

The cooperative invests in the electrical system to ensure there is enough capacity to meet the member’s highest projected demand.

The separated demand charge would allow the cooperative to more appropriately recover its investment in serving each individual member and align costs with cost-causation.

The impact of the general rate

case on individual member bills will vary based on the rate schedule under which an individual member takes service and the amount of electricity used.

With the proposed rate increase, A&N anticipates that it would be several years before another increase is needed.

In January 2024, the cooperative implemented a revenue-neutral rate adjustment to more equitably balance residential and commercial rates. However, this adjustment did not affect overall revenue.

The cooperative’s last general rate case was filed in 2018, in which the commission approved an increase in overall revenue by approximately 5.5%.

A&N’s rates currently produce the second lowest residential electric bills for an average customer compared to the other investor-owned utilities and cooperatives in Virginia and the Delmarva region.

If the commission approves the proposed rate increase, the monthly bill for an average A&N residential customer would still be lower than over half of those 16 electric service providers.

The general rate case will also amend the cooperative’s Terms and Conditions of Providing Electric Service.

VMRC votes to close winter dredging

On Monday, Oct. 28, the Virginia Marine Resources Commission voted to close the winter dredging season for blue crabs for the 2024/2025 season.

After extensive consideration of scientific data, public input, and recommendations from VMRC staff, the Crab Management Advisory Committee, and the Virginia Institute of Marine Science, the commission made the decision to prioritize ongoing conservation measures for the blue crab population. The final vote was 6-1.

This decision underscores VMRC's adaptive management approach to ensure the long-term health of the blue crab fishery.

By continually analyzing the fishery and the various harvesting methods, VMRC uses the best available science to make informed decisions that balance ecological protection with the needs of the fishing industry.

VMRC Commissioner Jamie Green praised the collaborative effort of VMRC staff and the Crab Management Advisory Committee.

"This is a win for blue crabs and a testament to the dedication of everyone involved," Green said. "Our ability to assess the crab fishery holistically, consider all gear types, and adapt our strategies based on the latest data is critical to keeping this vital resource healthy. I want to thank VMRC staff and the Crab Management Advisory Committee for their hard

work and thoughtful consideration of all the factors and for helping us to find the best path forward. This is a good day if you truly care about blue crabs and the livelihood of those they affect."

In June 2024, VMRC repealed the prohibition on crab dredging, which had been in place since 2008, after a recommendation from a Crab Management Advisory Committee vote in May of 2024.

This repeal was made to explore future management options for the fishery. Although this opened the possibility of a winter dredge fishery, the commission ultimately voted to close the 2024/2025 winter season to protect overwintering female crabs.

VMRC staff will remain focused on creating a regulatory framework for winter dredging should conditions in the blue crab fishery permit its reintroduction in the future.

In addition to the winter dredging closure, the commission also voted on the 2024/2025 crab pot season, opting to maintain the status quo.

Under this decision, the crab pot season will end on Dec. 16 and reopen on March 17.

The decision to continue status quo season dates was based on careful consideration of industry feedback and scientific advice and ensures that the crab pot fishery operates within sustainable boundaries.

Sanford United Methodist Church celebrates 140th anniversary

On Sunday, Oct. 20, Sanford United Methodist Church welcomed the community to celebrate its 140th anniversary. There was an 11 a.m. worship service and a homecoming service at 2 p.m., followed by a full meal in the social hall.

The church is located at 23169 Belinda Road, near the intersection of Belinda Road and Saxis Road, on the south end of the village of Sanford.

Since it was built in 1884, Sanford has been a traditional Methodist church. The window over the front door shows “Sanford M.E. Church” as when it was built in 1884 it was part of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, which was based in Baltimore to serve the southern states.

Downing’s Church, the oldest Methodist Church on the bayside in upper Accomack County, was the mother church.

At its founding it was on the West Accomack Circuit. The 1859 Downing’s Church membership showed 22 people from the “Bay Side” which was evidently the Sanford area as all other communities in the area, such as Guilford, Pocomoke (at Grotons) and Saxis Island were noted separately on the list.

The area known as Dreke was between the present-day Saxis Road, which runs through the center of the village, and the Pocomoke Sound to the west. It was later renamed Sanford, in honor of Samuel Sanford (1650-1711), a Merchant of London, who in 1693 became a member of the Virginia House of Burgesses and the high sheriff of Accomack County.

In his will written in England, he directed his 3,000 acres in the vicinity of Sanford to be rented out and the proceeds used to educate the poor children of this part of the county. It was known as the Sanford Charity and the Free School Land and continued in this tradi-

tion until its trustees deeded it to the new Virginia statewide school system about 1885.

In 1883 a group of forefathers saw the need of the great number of children in the village and the surrounding communities of Belinda, Marsh Market, Hammocks, and Dreke. The group, consisting of James Walter Hall, Charles Spencer, Raymond Lewis, and Amos C. Corbin, gathered the children in the old Sanford Charity schoolhouse in the middle of the village and start-

ed “The Sanford Class.” There were 141 charter members. It was in one of those Sanford Charity schoolhouses where the Sanford Methodist was formed.

In April 1883 Edward T. Stant and his wife Ann Janet Stant sold 1/6 acre of land to the church trustees, who were given five years to build a church or the land would revert to the Stants.

The church was built and dedicated in 1884. It was remodeled in 1893 and by 1900, when a par-

sonage was built, there were 189 members.

In 1910 the stained-glass windows were installed at a cost of \$25 per window. By the beginning of World War I in 1917 there were 253 members. Today there are 25 members on the roll.

The Sunday school wing was added in 1968 and a kitchen was added in 1982, which enabled church bazaars to be held every October for many years.

In 1994 the church belonged to the Hallwood, Sanford, and Saxis Charge, with one pastor doing three services on Sunday.

The first homecoming was held in 1950 and they were held for many years, including 1984 for the 100th anniversary of the church. The last one of record was in October of 2001.

After a 23-year lapse, it was decided to have a 140-year anniversary called, “Coming Home” this year.

The church’s nine-page history booklet was expanded to 22 pages to include detailed information about the names on the stained-glass windows installed in 1910, which was presented during the service.

The program included two traditional poems, “The Sanford Neck” and “The Perfect Church,” two piano solos by two members who grew up in the church, songs by someone whose mother grew up in the church, memories of growing up in Sanford Church, a message by pastor William Jefferson, and a prayer by a former pastor, Glenda Turlington.

Many beautiful flower arrangements were donated in memory of deceased loved ones. Presentations were given to the oldest member present (85 years), the oldest guest (97 years) and the one who traveled the farthest (Baltimore).

The service concluded with “Blessed Be the Tie that Binds” by John Fawcett.

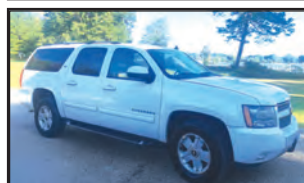

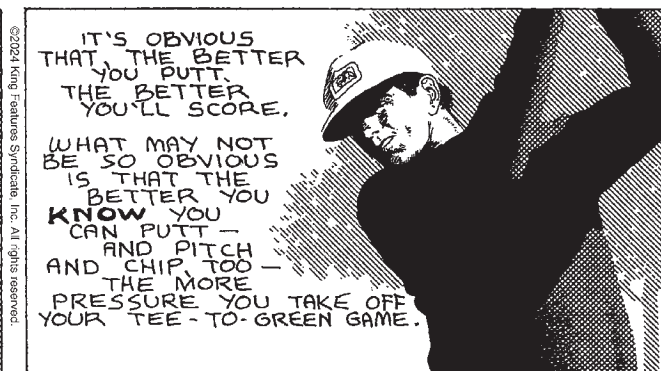
